RERLIN, Dec. 5.-The Post Pressuische Zeitung of Koenigsberg says: "Upon information gained from Russian refugees, complete anarchy prevails in the Russian Baltic provinces. government has wholly lost its power, and the military are beginning to fraternize with the revolutionists. One refugee says drunken soldiers parade the streets with socialists, waving red flags.

"The ferment among the sailors at Libau continues." The peasants have declared the clergy and officials deposed and are installing new local officials. They also prevent the estate owners from selling grain or wood, declaring that the forests are communal property.

"The protection of life and property has wholly ceased to exist. Bands of criminals are scouring the provinces, and numerous estate owners have been killed, their arms, horses and money have been seized, and their cattle burnt to death in the stables. The stream of fugitives crossing the frontier is daily increasing. Noblemen from the Baltic provinces are arriving at Koenigsberg to place their women and children in safety."
