draught. I then opened one gate in the 3-way hydrant 400 feet to the east on the same main. This would be equal to a draught of about five fire streams and the reduction of pressure was 23 lbs. It is the intention to extend the new 16 inch main through the town to Ramsay street and connect it directly with all the cross-town pipes, in which case the falling off in pressure for fire purposes will be considerably decreased and on this being done in the early summer of next year the town will have a very fine water system.

In March, 1908, before the new 16 inch main was brought into town I took the pressure at about the same level as the present test and found it to be only 48 lbs. with a much greater falling off for each additional stream for fire purposes.
