## GAVE A HOSPITAL

An American Born Woman of  
Conspicuous Achievement.

### ATTENDS FRIEND AND FOE.

Daughter of Paron Stevens of Boston Married an English Nobleman and Founded a Hospital That Did Remarkable Service in Serbia.

The Austro-Hungarian government has made public a high official tribute to the services rendered in Serbia by Lady Paget and her hospital. It is one of the rare occasions in this great war in which one belligerent nation has said a kind word, even in the name of humanity, about the subject of an enemy nation.

Lady Paget's hospital work in Serbia is well known to Americans, for she labored in direct co-operation with the American Red Cross. Says the report: "Even under the Servian regime it was thanks to Lady Paget's mission

among our prisoners that the epidemic of typhus did not have more victims. In her hospital she continually nursed 70 per cent of our soldiers. Those who recovered were well nourished and given clean linen and shoes before they were sent to the prison camp. The attendants in her hospital she recruited entirely out of our soldiers, who were well fed and housed. She always gave them clean linen, good clothes and good shoes. Lady Paget repeatedly visited our prison camp and did all she could to induce the Servians to be humane in their treatment of our people. The lady herself was the soul of the mission.

"As a result of Lady Paget's friendly treatment of the Austro-Hungarian prisoners she became the victim of suspicion in England and had to justify herself in a London meeting. There she declared—for we have read the speech which she made there—that she would continue her activity and if the standpoint that she took was not acceptable she would give up her post as the leader of this mission."

Lady Paget is American born, the daughter of Paron Stevens, at one time owner of the Tremont House in Boston. Her husband is General Sir Arthur H. Paget. Lady Paget's benefactions have been remarkable. During the Boer war she equipped a hospital ship and called it the Maine. She made a great collection of furniture of the period of James I. for the Jamestown exposition. She has been extremely popular in British society, particularly in the reign of Edward VII.

### FOR THE CHILDREN.

How to Make Raffia Dolls on Stormy Days.

If you have been making raffia baskets or picture frames save some of the leftover pieces of raffia for the children. They can make a whole family of dolls from them.

For a good sized father or mother doll the strips should be about fourteen inches long and plain colored. Just in the center tie them with a colored bit of raffia. The number of the strips you use will depend upon how fat you want your doll.

Next double the raffia over exactly in two and tie again about an inch from the top. Now you have the doll's head. Tie again at the waist and cut the skirt off evenly at the bottom if it is to be a lady doll.

If it is a man separate the raffia at the waist and tie his trousers at the bottoms.

For arms put a few strands of raffia through the body and tie at the wrist and shoulder. Your raffia must be long enough for both arms.

The children of the raffia family will

be made the same way, but smaller.

Silver Lace and Pale Blue Silk.  
Silver lace and pale blue silk is an effective combination for the debutante. and it is carried out in one model in dounces of silver lace over a skirt of faint blue soiree silk, and underneath is a second skirt of silver cloth. The blue soiree silk bodice is trimmed with bands of silver ribbon and flesh pink tulle in a single airy layer, giving the debutante touch at the shoulder, for the young girl does not wear an entirely sleeveless bodice. Pale pink roses shading to orchid tone are caught against girle and skirt hem.

## RANK OF MARSHAL

A Military Honor Instituted by a  
King of France.

### THE TITLE AN ANCIENT ONE.

It Was First Conferred by Philip Augustus in 1191, at the Time of the Third Crusade—The Baton Is Its Distinctive Badge of Office.

It is only in France that the military dignity of marshal is a very ancient one. It was King Philip Augustus who first instituted it as a military office in 1191, at the time of the third crusade. St. Louis invested two of his commanders with the rank on the eve of his ill fated expedition to northern Africa. Francis I. created three, and by the time that Louis XIV. had completed his long reign there were no less than twenty of them.

The office was abolished by the first republic, but restored by Napoleon I. when he proclaimed himself emperor. He limited the number to sixteen. They were known as marshals of the empire. The Bourbon monarchy on its restoration in 1815 maintained them in office, but changed their title back to that of marshals of France. By the law of 1839, bearing the sign manual of King Louis Philippe, their number was limited to six in time of peace and twelve in time of war.

The baton, as provided for by existing military regulations in France, consists of a staff about two feet long, an inch and a half in diameter, covered with dark blue velvet, decked with gold stars and tipped at either end with silver gilt, on the borders of which are engraved the Latin words, "Terror belli, decus pacis." It is carried in the right hand at all great military or state functions and is used in lieu of the saber for saluting. The baton of the field marshal of Great Britain is tipped at either end with crowns and lions; those of Germany, Austria and Russia with single headed or double headed eagles.

In England the dignity of field marshal was unknown until the reign of George II., who in 1735 bestowed it upon the second Duke of Argyll, one of the greatest commanders and statesmen of his day and of whom Pope wrote:

Argyll, the state's whole thunder born to wield  
And shake alike the senate and the field.

The first Duke of Marlborough, the victor of Blenheim, of Ramillies and of Malplaquet, bore the title of captain general to indicate his rank as generalissimo, a title undoubtedly originating in Spain, where it is still retained. It is regarded there as the equivalent of the grade of field marshal in other countries.

There are no field marshals at present in Russia. The last two commanders to hold that rank were the late Field Marshal Gourko, governor general of Poland, and the late Grand Duke Michael Nicholavitch, who when he died was the patriarch of the imperial house of Romanoff.

In Austria-Hungary there is but one field marshal—namely, Archduke Frederick. He is a brother of the queen mother of Spain and heir to all the colossal fortune of his uncle, the late Archduke Albert, who had won his marshal's baton on the battlefield of Custoza.

The full generals in Austria bear the title of "feldzeugmeister" (master of the ordnance) when they belong to the artillery, while all lieutenant generals are known as "feldmarschal lieutenant," a title which is being continually mistranslated abroad as that of field

In Italy, Scandinavia, Belgium and Holland and in the armies of the Balkan states the rank of field marshal is unknown, although the late King Charles of Roumania had received batons from Czar Nicholas II. and from the kaiser. Portugal, too, has dispensed with field marshals.

It is in Germany, however, that field marshals flourish, but only since the present kaiser has been on the throne. Just prior to the death of old Emperor William in 1888 there were but two field marshals in the entire German army—namely, the then Crown Prince (afterward Frederick III.) and Count Moltke, both of whom had received their batons at the close of the Franco-German war of 1870. As soon as the present emperor came to the throne he began to confer the dignity with such liberality that there are now fully a score of them, including Duke Bernhard of Saxe-Meiningen, the Grand Duke of Baden, Prince Henry of Prussia and Baron von Plessen. Besides these there are about a dozen more with the rank of "general oberst," or colonel general, whose rank is assimilated to that of field marshal and who are above the full general.—F. Cunliffe-Owen in New York Sun.
