

WARWICK COUNCIL

The council of the township of Warwick met on the 24th of March, as per adjournment. Members all present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.

Campbell-Parker, that the Reeve and Clerk as representatives of the Council board, be instructed to sign the petition to the Government asking them to make permanent the war-time prohibition.—Carried.

Muma—Williamson, that the clerk notify the delegation from Watford that the council of the Township of Warwick will not co-operate with them in the erection of a memorial monument.—Carried.

Campbell-Higgins, that the Council and Clerk be a committee to get the names of all those from the township or those born in the township who have offered their lives and services in the defence of the Empire in the late war and that the same be arranged in such a manner as to form a fitting Honor Roll to be framed and erected in the Town Hall to their memory and honor. And that we request all those having friends or who know of anyone who should be included in this list to send the necessary information to the clerk or other members of the council.—Carried.

Campbell—Muma, that the Reeve grant his order in favor of the Forest Agricultural Society for \$25, the grant to be paid on Oct. 1st.—Carried.

Higgins—Campbell, that the Reeve grant his order in favor of Robt. McKenzie for seventy-five cents for postage collecting the taxes.—Carried.

John Long served a notice on the Reeve claiming damages for Ellen Long for closing Guy street in Warwick Village.—Carried.

Higgins—Muma, that we take no action in the above.—Carried.

Higgins—Muma, that the matter of the erection of a Memorial in honor of our fallen soldiers be laid over for the present for further consideration.—Carried.

Williamson—Campbell, that the clerk notify C. A. Jones, engineer, that his services under the Ditch and Water-courses Act for the township has expired.—Carried.

Campbell—Muma, that the division of the township into wards be changed and that No. 1 and No. 4 wards be extended to include the Egremont Road, and that No. 3 ward be extended to but not to include the Egremont Road, and that appropriations for No. 1 and No. 4 wards be \$600 each and Nos. 2 and 3 \$800 each, but to remain as before for election purposes.—Carried.

Frank Ward and others and C. E. Lester and others presented petitions for Municipal Drains when it was moved by Mr. Muma, seconded by Mr. Williamson, that both petitions be accepted and that the Clerk be instructed to notify the engineer to examine the same and report.—Carried.

Higgins—Muma, that we instruct the Clerk to send for 6 copies of the Municipal Word for the use of the council.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Campbell, second by Mr. Higgins, that we reengage N. Herbert as clerk for 1919 at a salary of \$150.00.—Carried.

Campbell—Muma, that the clerk be authorized to have printed 200 copies of the Standing by-laws of the township as revised and amended by the Municipal Council of the Tp. of Warwick, on the 24th day of March 1919.—Carried.

The Council then adjourned to meet on Monday, 28th day of April, at one o'clock p. m., for general business.—Carried.

Distinguished Service Cross
To Michigan Boy

Washington, D. C., March 19.—The war department has announced the award of the distinguished service cross to Private Blake Bell, of Kinde, Mich. The citation follows:

Private Blake Bell, headquarters company, Fourth infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Cunel, France, October 20th. When all superiors of the platoon had become casualties, Private Bell assumed command, and efficiently conducted the operations. When his guns had been put out of action, he personally salvaged the parts and resumed fire. When relieved, he safely conducted the remnants of the platoon from the line. Home address, William Bell, brother, Kinde, Mich.

Pte. Bell is a nephew of Mrs. A. J. Hagle, of Watford.

Charles McGibbon, of the McGibbon Lumber Co., Penetanguishene, formerly Inspector of Indian Agencies for Ontario, died suddenly on Saturday on the train at Glenwood Springs, Col., while en route to visit his son Finlay, who resides in Vancouver.

The Late Mrs. Maw

On Saturday, March 15th, Mrs. John Maw, of Wyoming, passed away, having suffered from a paralytic stroke on the previous Wednesday. The funeral took place the following Tuesday from her late home, conducted by her pastor, Rev. Geo. Jewitt, and Rev. Geo. N. Hazen, B.A., a former and highly esteemed pastor. Mrs. Maw was born in Yorkshire, England, on April 19th, 1843. She was the daughter of the late Richard and Mrs. Rogers. During the year 1846 the parents with their two daughters started for America, the mother dying at sea. The father and the girls came to the Gore of Toronto where they made their home twenty-four years. While there, on the 17th of March, 1869, she was married to John Maw, her now sorrowing husband. Thus for nearly sixty years they as husband and wife have enjoyed each other's fellowship. Forty-nine years ago with their family they moved to the old homestead in Plympton township, where for thirty-two years they made their home, the last seventeen years of life being spent in the village of Wyoming. Mrs. Maw was a good woman, a loving and faithful mother, a kind neighbor and for fifty years a member of the Methodist church in which she served most earnestly her Savior and Master. The following survive and mourn her loss: Her husband, John Maw, of Wyoming; three daughters, Mrs. Jas. Rawson, of London; Mrs. James Williams, of Petrolia; Mrs. James Stonehouse, of Wyoming; and four sons, Newton of Sarnia township; James, of Copleston; John of Wyoming, and Henry on the old homestead.

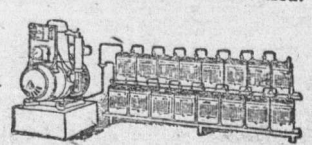
