FEMININE DAIRY WISDOM

The 'chief cause of the difficulty of getting butter in winter, is that the cream is too cold or too old. The temperature of ordinary farm cream in winter should be from sixty eight degrees to seventy-two degrees. If a separator has been used from two degrees to four degrees lower will often bring better results.

Another important condition to re member is not to have too much skim milk in the cream. Skim the pans or cans carefully taking as little milk as possible in

the process. If cream has been allowed 'to be come too old and bitter, it will be mpossible to get good butter, or to churn in a reasonable length of time. Proper temperature and rich cream
