Plumbago larpenæ and *P. rosea* and its variety *coccinea* are also catalogued by nurserymen. The first of these is of a dwarf habit, the branches being nearly prostrate with flowers of a deep blue, and the other *rosea* and its variety is an upright grower though not at all in

habit like *Capensis*. Its brick-red flowers are borne in airy spikes at the end of the shoots and is very useful as a winter bloomer.
