The Dr. said that the characteristic pain in the left iliae region, which is almost pathogomenic of uterino disease, the pain along the course of the crural nerves, the bearing down, the distressing pains in the lumbar or sacral regions, the nausen, the anorexia, the irregularity of the bowels were all absent. The tongue was clean, the appetite good, the pulse normal, the bowels regular, and the patient looked well nourished.

The only objective symptom which appeared to indicate something wrong with the uterus, was the occasional appearance at the estima various of a shight, groupish rellow maco-parulent discharge. The patient complains of pain in the right hy pochondraw region, laminating in its character, and radiating, as it were, over the epigastrum. The pain is aggravated after exertion, and at the menstrual periods. She is very pervous and dopressed, bursting into tears on the slightest provocation, very despondent, very garralous, and very imaginative. It had been "revealed to her in a dream," that "the covering of the liver, where it joins the ribs, was in a diseased condition," and this sho firmly believed, until the introduction of the speculum disclosed a more tangible cause for her suffering. The intra vaginal portion of the cercix uteri was almost entirely denuded of mucous mombrano, the papillæ were enlarged, the diseased surface was intensely red, and bathed in a muco-purulent secretion of a greenishyellow color. In short, it was a typical case of ulceration of the os and cervix, like those described and gorgeously painted in the books, one that would have remixed the heart of Dr. Bennett. He believed that he had discovered the fons at arise male, and he cauterized the diseased surface with a great deal of savage satisfaction. Forty-ought hours after the casterization he directed the patient to begin the use of injections of sulpho carbolate of zine, tas first recommended by his friend Dr. Mack, in the treatment of vaginities), in the proportion of one drachm of the salt to a pint of rain water. Having observed the calming and strongthning influence produced by the shower bath and cold sponging in choren and other nervous affections, he directed the patient to take cold sponge baths, using water imprognated with " Atlantic sea salt." As a placebo, he gave her a mixture containing chloric other, fluid extract of valerian, and sp lavandula co. to take when the pain war severe, and her feelings were too
