The weather during the past week has not been at all what is just now wanted to ripen the crops, and all classes of the people knowing how much depends on a good harvest this year are devoutly hoping for a change.

His Grace the Archbishop of St. Boniface is expected home to-day. He will immediately resume the episcopal visitation, going to Lorette to-morrow and the day after to-morrow to St. Ann's, where His Grace will lay the corner stone of the new church.

We notice in the telegraphic reports from Bisley that our friend Staff Sergt. Wynne, of the 9th has been making some good shooting. It is worthy of record that the Queen's Prize was this year won by a Canadian, viz. Private Hayhurst, of Hamilton, Ont.

The Winnipeg Industrial Exhibition held last week was practically spoilt by the rain and we regret to hear that the consequence is that the Directors have to face a heavy deficit. Had the weather been propitious there is little doubt the exhibition would have been the most successful one ever held. The number and quality of the exhibits were far in excess of previous years, the throng of visitors from the country was greater than ever before, and the Directors with the assistance of the energetic and able manager, Mr. Heubach, had left nothing undone on their part to ensure success. Unfortunately, however, there was only one really fine day, viz. Friday and then the grounds, and especially the track, were so soaked by the rains of the previous day as to make it anything but pleasant for those who visited the fair. The Annual Outing of the Parishioners of the Immaculate Conception.

LEYDEN CRITICIZED.

To the Editor of the Tribune.
Tribune, July 11th.

SIR,—In listening to Mr. Leyden's lectures, one is pained beyond measure to mark the levity with which he generally treats subjects so precious and dear to our Roman Catholic friends. There is a vein of sarcastic humor throughout his address, an undisguised desire to provoke indecorous outbursts over some unseemly witticism from the audience. In speaking of the eucharist the lecturer always brings down the house with the climax in referring to the bread as "their pan-cake God." To me all this is unutterably nauseating, and I more than suspect that his want of support by ministers of this city is due to a higher feeling of gentlemanly courtesy prevailing amongst them. I know if I was chairman of such a meeting I should respectfully reprove my brother for this frivolity or leave the chair as an impossible position for me. Our citizenship must overlay a broad spirit of gentlemanly courtesy with firmness, rather than contemptuous ribaldry against our Roman Catholic friends, and with all my soul I cry aloud against the possible corruption of our British freedom by our American guest. Mr. Leyden's treatment of purgatory was more the production of a comic speaker than a Christian, and I suppose, a scholar. Instead of dealing with the subject of the state of the dead with the solemnity and decorum the subject demands, his lecture was full of mirth-provoking points, and his general grasp and treatment of the subject was anything but satisfactory. He never gave us to understand the basis upon which purgatory was logically, if not scripturally, established. He never gave us the strong, and however the plausible arguments based upon exegesis of certain scripture. True, he mentioned a long string of texts, but he never quoted those which he should have done. For instance, Mr. Leyden knows very well that the passage in Peter of Christ going and preaching to the spirits in prison is even by Protestant commentators accepted as some sort of a detention place for "immortal souls." Roman Catholics have much in agreement with commentators on this text, and so with many other texts which the lecturer mentioned, but failed to quote. That there was a necessity logically to invent a place of detention, call it purgatory, limbo, or hades, is the strong position which the Roman Catholic takes, and he believes that many of the passages in scripture support that invention or hypothesis. The change of Saturday Sabbath to Sunday has not a better and surer foundation than the argument for the necessity of a purgatory. I merely mention this as an instance to demonstrate that while Mr. Leyden was eminently successful in raising contemptuous laughter, he lamentably failed to satisfy the Bible student who paid 25 cents to hear him.
