Keith Krause

Keith Krause is a Professor of International Politics at the Graduate Institute of International Studies in Geneva, and an Associate Professor of Political Science (on leave) at York University, where he was the Deputy Director of the Centre for International and Strategic Studies. He is the author of *Arms and the State* (Cambridge University Press, 1992), and numerous articles and chapters on various aspects of the global arms trade. His current research concentrates on military expenditures, armed forces and state-formation in the post-colonial Middle East, and on efforts to redefine the concept "threats to international peace and security" in United Nations peace and security operations. He is a graduate of the University of Alberta and of Balliol College (Oxford).

Ken Epps

Ken Epps is Program Co-ordinator for Project Ploughshares, a Canadian peace and disarmament research and advocacy group based at the Institute for Peace and Conflict Studies at Conrad Grebel College, the University of Waterloo. Since 1986, when he joined Project Ploughshares, Mr. Epps has managed the Canadian Military Industry Database. Through Ploughshares publications he regularly reports on the Canadian military industry and military exports. He has an M.Math degree from the University of Waterloo.
