In each of the past five years (a) what consideration has been given to studies of relevance or significance to Indian people in Canada (b) how many studies of relevance or significance to Indian people in Canada have been assisted financially (c) how many Canadian Indians have applied for Canada Council grants (d) how many Canadian Indians have received Canada Council grants (e) how many Canadian Indians have applied for Canada Council grants for research of relevance or significance to Indian people in Canada (f) how many Canadian Indians have received Canada Council grants of relevance or significance for Indian people in Canada?

- Mr. J. A. Jerome (Parliamentary Secretary to President of The Privy Council): (a) and (b) The Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development advises that it would involve an inordinate cost and time to provide the information requested. To provide the information required, the Canada Council would have to review at least 10,000 individual files of doctoral and of research grants applications and awards for the past five years as the present information retrieval system was designed to collate information by discipline rather than by topic of research. The Council is developing its information retrieval capabilities to include collation by research topic in the future.
- (c), (d), (e), and (f) The Canada Council advises that the information is not available because applicants are not required to show their racial origin.
