BRAKEMAN FELL AND WAS KILLED

G. Sorensen of Ward Seven Fatally Injured at Buckskin Station.

HE MISSED HIS FOOTING

Remains Are Being Held Until Relatives Are Heard From.

COLDWATER, May 27.—(Special).—Shortly after 3 o'clock this morning a C.P.R. freight train brought in the body of Louis G. Sorensen, a brakeman belonging to the crew of the train, who was killed at Buckskin Station, a few miles north of Coldwater.

Sorensen was walking on top of the cars while shunting operations were being carried on near Buckskin, and while crossing the gap between the cars of the next car, missed his footing, and was seen to fall between them. The wheels of the caroose passed over his head, instantly killing him, and the remains were taken on to Coldwater.

An inquest was opened here by Coroner W. B. Boyd of West Simcoe and adjourned, and the remains were sent on to Toronto. The man's home was in Baker, Minn., and his relatives have been telegraphed, the remains staying at Speers' undertaking rooms until word is received concerning interment. He was about thirty years of age, and boarded at 47 Hook avenue, West Toronto. He was unmarried, but is survived by his mother and father and several brothers and sisters in Minnesota.

This is the second fatality occurring under almost identical circumstances here within the last few weeks.

REFUSE TO AFFIRM PRINCIPLE OF EQUALIZED RAILWAY RATES

W. F. Maclean's Resolution Declaring Against Discrimination in Tolls Exact in Eastern and Western Canada Rejected After Interesting Discussion—Railway Commission Needs Parliament's Guidance, Says South York Member.

OTTAWA, May 27.—(Special).—By a vote of 42 to 59 the house of commons this morning defeated a resolution offered by Mr. W. F. Maclean (South York) declaring that there should be no discrimination as between Eastern and Western Canada in the tolls charged for freight and other services within the jurisdiction of the board of railway commissioners for Canada.

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Mr. Maclean's resolution, offered as an amendment upon the motion to go into supply, was construed by Hon. Frank Cochrane on behalf of the government as being tantamount to a want of confidence vote, and under this spreading chestnut tree of an excuse, many Conservative members assembled. Mr. J. D. Taylor, the Conservative member for New-Westminster, spoke and voted against the resolution as being moved by the member for South York "for the purposes of advertisement." The bulk of the discussion, however, was carried on by the opposition members, all of whom supported the amendment with the exception of Hon. Charles March.

Parliament Must Act. Mr. Maclean, in submitting his resolution, said that he had consulted no one concerning it, and did not even know whether it would receive a second reading.
