HOW BIRDS MIGRATE

TOLD BY OBSERVER

Educational Lecture on Bird Life Given Before Large Audience Last Night.

H. M. Speechly, an eminent Manitoba naturalist and one of the Canadian observers for the Biological Survey of the United States, gave an educational lecture last night on bird life and migration, at a meeting held under the auspices of the Canadian Society for the Protection of Birds, in the physics building of the university. There was an exceptionally large attendance and a number of delegates to the Anglican synod were present.

In his address, which was illustrated with lantern slides, he gave a general outline of the situation of Manitoba in bird migration.

Miss Helen M. Merrill, the president of the society, occupied the chair.
