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one another; and therefore, whatever affects one affects atl. You have already feen, that by the Revocation of the Edict of Nantzin 1685, and the Perfecution that enfued upon it France lost above half a Million of industrious, manufacturing Protestants and during the two Wars from 1688 to 1714 near a Million and a half of her best Men; that she has lost three Millions and a half Sterling per Annum in her Trade with England and Holland, and there is a Deficiency of above three Millions Sterl. in the old Funds or Branches of the publick Revenue; then, according to what is laid down above, and in my humble Opinion incontestably, these Facts prove and confirm one another, and all of them together demon. strate, that France, at this time, is neither so flourishing, so rich, nor so powerful as she was threescore Years ago.

Some time since I was told a particular Fact, which I could not give credit to; but as this Deduction makes it extremely probable, I will mention it in this place. The Fact is, that a few Years ago, upon
