was the first house of stone and mortar erected in Canada. Here was, at one time, the missionary station and residence of Father Marquette, the explorer of the Mississippi. The old Catholic chapel is still standing where these services were held. Tadousac was formerly an important trading post of the Hudson Bay Company, but this has now been removed to Chicoutimi. On the southern shore is the establishment of the Riviere du Canard.

Half a mile above Tadousac is the little village of "L'ANSE A J'EAU," where there is a lumber establishment. The steamers usually stop for a short time at this place.

"TETE DU BOULE" is a round mountain peak, rising about one thousand feet above the river, and distant a little over a mile from the mouth.

St. Louis Island is distant eighteen miles from Tadousac, and is passed on either side by vessels.

Thirty-four miles from Tadousac rise the enormous masses of rock called "Point Eternity" and "Cape Trinity," of which the accompanying engraving is a very truthful representation.

Point Eternity is estimated to be two thousand feet above the water, and is a perpendicular wall of granite; the water is very deep at the base, and the steamers pass so near that the rocks can almost be touched by the hand.
