She will have resolved successfully the great problem, how to secure the enjoyments of order and public tranquillity with the least possible check upon the dovelopment of the human faculties; in short, how to obtain for man in the greatest proportions the blessings of security, peace, liberty, and knowledge. She will have resolved this problem, too, by a machinery much less complicated, and much less expensive, than the constitution of England."—Lord John Russell, English Constitution, 1823.
