

Changing Baby's Food

I am not waiting until the regular question and answer day, "Anxious Mother." I am answering your query right away, partly because your baby is two months late now starting her new food, and partly because of late I have answered personally a number of questions about this same important subject—weaning.

The ideal way to wean a baby is to start about the sixth month— or even earlier, to give one meal a day from the bottle. Then the mother is free to leave the baby for several hours it occasion demands, and the change from the mother's milk to other food is made gradually and easily. At 13 months, Anxious Mother, your baby should be entirely weaned. Your milk is not substantial enough now. You will have to use the bottle at some meals, but whenever possible feed with a spoon or from a cup.

You will need one pint of certified milk every day. This must be modified with boiled water and sugar. Early in the morning mix up the amount required for the day, and keep it in as cold a place as possible until required.
