ROSSLAND ORE SHIPMENTS

Are About Double What They Were

a Year Ago.

Which are the Producing Mines—

The C.P.R. and Its Smelter at

Trail—Reported Sale of the Cooxey

and Gertrude Claims—Notes.

The ore production of the mines at Ross-

land continues to increase. The shipments

of ore to the smelters for the week ending

May 21st totalled 2038 tons, as compared

with 1041 tons for the corresponding week

of last year. The shipments came from

four producers, as follows:

1. The Rossland Mine, 102; 2. Centre

Star, 45; 3. From Mack, 102; total, 2038 tons.

The Rossland Mine, which gives these

figures, goes on to state that the ore ship-

ments from the mines adjacent to Rossland

from Jan. 1 to May 21 of this year, have

totalled 31,451 tons, made up as follows:

1. The Rossland Mine, 102; 2. Centre

Star, 45; 3. From Mack, 102; total, 31,451

tons. The total shipments from the camp since

Jan. 1, 1897, have aggregated 104,101 tons.

TRAIL SMELTER.

C.P.R. Increasing Its Facilities for

Treating Gold and Silver Ore.

In view of the likelihood of the immedi-

ate awarding of the contracts for the con-

struction of the Columbia and Western

Railway, which will be an extension of the

C.P.R. into the Boundary country, the

Canadian Pacific authorities are, by

arranging their smelter at Trail, making

preparations to take advantage of the ad-

ditional facilities which the completion of

that line will give them. When the com-

pany is able to bring together cheaply

the silver-lead ore from the Sloan and the

Rossland and Boundary products they will

be able to effect a complete flux, and thus

escape a great deal of expense now incur-

red. At present there is one big roast

heap, containing 1000 tons of crushed ore,

burning, and another is now in use, re-

constructing 45 roasting ovens and an im-

mense stack to carry away the sulphur fumes.

In these ovens the ore will in future be

roasted.

COXEY AND GERTRUDE.

Two More Rossland Claims Reported

Sold to an English Company.

A Rossland claim, the Spokane

Spokane says: A new company, the

Gold Fields, Limited, has been formed by

Clarence McQuinn of Montreal to share

the English markets the Coxeey and the

Gertrude, on Red Mountain. The new

company has a capitalization of \$300,000,

in 200,000 shares of the par value of 25

cents each. The stock is to be floated at

par on the English market. The project

took form at a special meeting of the Mont-

real-Rossland Gold Fields. The directors

were instructed to form the new com-

pany for \$375,000 worth of its stock.

meeting of the Montreal-Rossland Gold

Fields Company will be held later on, as

soon as the new company is organized, to

complete a transfer. Shareholders in the

present company will receive scrip in the

new company in the proportion of 2 1/2

shares of Montreal Gold Fields stock for

one share in the Montreal-Rossland Gold

Fields. The new company was es-

tablished \$40,000 in developing the Gertrude.

HON. E. BLAKE ON GLADSTONE

The Eloquent Canadian Gave an Ad-

dress, Which Greatly Affected

Those Who Heard It.

A letter in The Catholic Register of this

party on May 20 in London, touching the

death of Mr. Gladstone. The speech was

made in moving this resolution:

"The Irish Nationalist Party expresses

its profound grief at the death of William

Edward Gladstone, the greatest of Eng-

lishmen, who proved himself the faithful friend

of the Irish Nation, and declares that his

services, his sacrifices and his devotion

Ireland will give him an imperishable place

in the hearts and memory of the Irish peo-

ple."

I am sure it requires no words from me

hurry and bustle, of noise and clamor,

of notoriety and push, where figures that

because of his intellectual powers and his

industrious use of the ten talents com-

mitted to his care, but because of his

tion of his fellow-men. Sir, we Irish owe

him a limitless debt of gratitude. He it was

who set our movement on its true way, and

it is good in these dark days to re-

me say that in its rapidity, in its thorough-

ness, in its lasting consequences, the re-

volution effected by Mr. Gladstone in pub-

lic opinion here in this island and all the

world over on the Irish National question

was not merely extraordinary, but it would

have been absolutely impossible for any

one else, for no one else has in demo-

cratic days ever secured so great a suc-

cess at once in the hearts and in the minds

of the people at large, or so awayed their

judgment. We deplore, but we are not
