should commend itself to every women's organization in the country. He also spoke highly of Mr. J. Kelso, the superintendent of the work, and also of Mrs. Harvey. Since the establishment of the Children's Ald Society, with its numerous branches, over two thousand children had been provided with good homes.

Aberdeen congratulated 'he delegates on the present excellent standing of the National Council in this respect, but reminded them that, while \$1000 only was needed annually to pay the general expenses of the Council, at the end of three years the special guarantee fund of \$1000 yearly to pay the expenses of the general secretary's office would cease to exist, and then the local councils would have to raise at least \$2000 annually.


