CAMPAIGN LAUNCHED TO ENLIST 800,000 BRITISHERS IN U.S.

NEW YORK, May 31.—A campaign to enlist some of the estimated 800,000 British subjects in this country was begun today when officers for the "British recruiting mission" were engaged here. Actual recruiting will not be started, however, until Brigadier-General W. A. White, head of the mission, outlines its object in a statement which is expected on Monday.

The mission includes seven officers besides General White. They have been here looking over the situation. Whether the mission will establish recruiting stations in other cities of the United States will depend on the success achieved here, it was said.

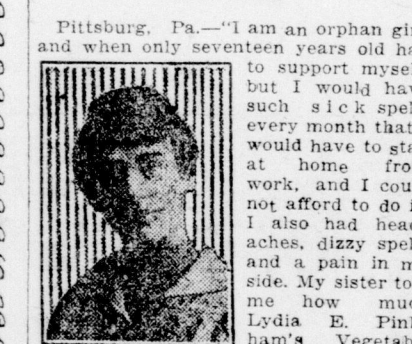

CANADIAN CLUB HAS LARGEST MEMBERSHIP IN ITS HISTORY NOW

Mrs. Donald McLean Chosen President for Third Time.

A YEAR OF GOOD WORK

Members Are Taking Great Share in Civic and Patriotic Activities.

At the annual meeting of the Women's Canadian Club held yesterday afternoon in the Normal School, Mrs. Donald McLean was honored by being elected president for the third time. The club at the present time has not only the largest membership in its history, but also the largest amount of work ever accomplished before. Its activities extend to every branch of patriotic effort, and to many others, as well.

Other officers elected yesterday were: First vice-president, Mrs. F. E. Leonard; second vice-president, Miss McColl; third vice-president, Mrs. Hughes; fourth vice-president, Mrs. Thomas Baker; secretary, Mrs. A. B. Greer; treasurer, Mrs. A. J. Edwards; corresponding secretary, Mrs. Cleghorn; executive committee, Mrs. Ray Lawson, Mrs. Harry Dapty, Miss E. Yeates, Miss Fairbairn, Mrs. Jared Vining, Mrs. R. C. McCann, Mrs. H. H. Bingham, Mrs. John Stearns, Mrs. Harry Coleman, Mrs. H. B. White.

Reports of the most gratifying nature were presented by Mrs. A. R. Greer and Mrs. A. T. Edwards. They showed that the past year has been a most active one, and that the members have helped in the Belgian and Serbian relief work, in the establishment of a military ward at the Byron Sanatorium, and the campaign recently held to aid the Y. M. C. A. overseas. One of the big events of the year was the bringing to London of William Howard Taft.

The secretary reported that 46 prizes were distributed to the public school pupils of the city for essays.

The delegates to the win-the-war convention at Montreal, Mrs. Donald McLean and Mrs. A. T. Edwards, gave a report on what was done.

Mrs. Donald McLean, in her presidential address, thanked the members for the loyal support and co-operation they had given her during the year. She reminded them that 1917 marks the 50th anniversary of Confederation, and she hoped that the members of the Canadian clubs throughout their activities would try to reach that new order of things which must inevitably be brought about through the war. No one, she said, knows what the future holds, but it is certain that there will be tremendous and sweeping changes. She stated that there are now over a hundred Canadian clubs in the Dominion, all doing splendid work.

CENTENNIAL CHURCH GROWING STEADILY

A good attendance in spite of the rain marked the annual meeting of the Centennial Methodist Church last night when reports of the year's work presented showed that favorable progress had been made. The total amount of money raised during the year for all purposes was \$7,109. The membership was increased by eleven making the total 481. Removals through death and other causes totaled 31.

For connectional funds \$1,053 was raised. Four thousand and eighteen dollars was received by the trustees' board.

The report of the Sunday school was presented by J. J. Paine, who has increased attendance. T. R. Somerville presented the Epworth League report. Mrs. Steele that of the W. M. S. The Ladies' Aid report was presented. The president, Mrs. Leitch, was unable to be at the meeting. Miss May presented the report of the Hope Circle and Miss Muriel Launceston of the Mission Circle. The report of class meetings was presented by James White.

BRITAIN CAN FEED HERSELF ENTIRELY IN ANOTHER YEAR

This Year's Harvest Will Scarcely Be Sufficient.

LONDON, May 31.—In an address in London today Rowland E. Prothero, president of the board of agriculture, said that under a plan devised by the Government, the success of which he believed to be assured, Great Britain would grow sufficient wheat in 1918 for all the needs of the population, and a liberal surplus left over for livestock.

Mr. Prothero said this depended upon the solution of agricultural problems facing the country, but if these were disposed of, "even if we started with nothing in hand and not a grain of wheat in this country, we would still be able to take the normal rate to get the nine million loaves daily, which, roughly, are what we require."

The speaker said he did not believe the recent harvest would produce the required quantity, but he felt that if the country economized in the use of foodstuffs, and the Government could not do so, the country could be self-sufficient in wheat.

The speaker said the German might inflict some measure of discomfort and live on the new harvest, plus the amount of wheat the Government had in hand in September, would be sufficient.

THREE ARE CHARGED WITH TREASON IN OHIO

COLUMBUS, Ohio, May 31.—Charges of treason, a capital offense, were laid against three men who were arrested during the day in connection with anti-registration plotting in Columbus. Each pleaded not guilty before United States Commissioner Johnson and were held under \$25,000 bond to await preliminary hearing Saturday morning. A federal grand jury will be assembled Tuesday to investigate the arrests.

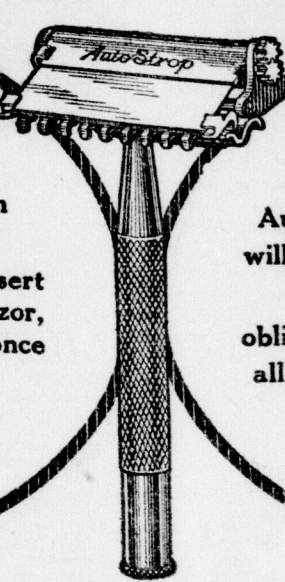

STATES FOLLOWING CANADIAN LEAD IN BARRING SLACKERS

Refuses Permission to Eligibles to Leave Country.

DETROIT, May 31.—Beginning at midnight tonight the United States Government will put into force an order forbidding permission to any American citizen of eligible military age, 21 to 31, to leave this country. The necessary departmental orders have been made, and copies placed in the hands of American immigration officials here who will obey them to the letter.

CANADA A GUIDE FOR N. Y. NATIONAL GUARD

NEW YORK, May 31.—From the lessons learned from troops training in Canada for overseas service, the New York National Guard, regiments will profit when they go south into camps, and tonight by District Attorney Boland, the state National Guard, said today. Gen. O'Day recently made a trip to Canadian training posts.

POLES TO RUSSIAN FRONT

OTTAWA, May 26.—(Correspondence)—The first Polish regiment, forming part of the Polish division of riflemen formed in the southwestern part of Russia, has left for the Russian front.

SAYS ORGANIZED LABOR OPPOSES CONSCRIPTION TO VERY LAST MAN

Vice-President of Dominion Trades Congress Speaks.

OTTAWA, May 31.—The conference of the International Machinery Union, which has been held behind closed doors here for the last two days, closed tonight. The decision on the conscription issue was not announced, but will be divulged at the meetings of representatives of eighty unions, which begin here tomorrow. It is believed the sessions shall be a practical war conference of organized labor in Canada.

RUSSIANS BEAT OFF ATTACKS OF TURKS

PETROGRAD, May 31, via London.—Troops of the Russian Caucasus army have successfully beaten off hostile attacks at several points in Armenia, and on the Mesopotamian front, according to today's war office statement. No change in the situation along the battle lines in the Russo-Galician or Armenia are reported.

CANADIAN CUSTOMS SHOW BIG INCREASE

First Two Months of Fiscal Year Rise \$8,000,000.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, May 31.—The second month of the new fiscal year shows another enormous increase in customs revenue. Last month the revenue was \$17,144,368, which is over four millions more than in May a year ago. The two months of the fiscal year brought a revenue of over thirty-one and a quarter millions—nearly eight millions more than the same period last year.

BRITISH TRAWLERS TERROR TO U-BOATS, SAYS ROBERT LOWRY
