Kitchener Loses First Game to Winnipeg Team

TORONTO, March 12.—By a score of 3 to 2, the Ypres Club, amateur champions of Western Canada, defeated Kitchener, champions of the Ontario Hockey Association, in the first game of the Allan Cup finals at the arena here tonight.

It was a hard fought game, with the Winnipeg team appearing the better balanced and stronger defensively. They also displayed the better team play and are certain to be favorites for the final struggle, which will be staged on Thursday under western rules.

Winkler Busy Early.
Kitchener staged the first attack almost from the face-off, and Winkler was called upon to stop two shots in quick succession from Miller and Carlson. The teams set a terrific pace from the outset. Kargues was felled for tripping Darnell. Five minutes had elapsed when Hughes got the first shot on goal for Winnipeg. Hainsworth stopped it. Kargues returned as Trushinski rushed and shot hard, but Winkler cleared nicely. A. Irvin was benched for upsetting Parke, but returned. Winkler stopped several hard shots from Miller and Solomon, one of the latter's shots hitting the Winnipeg goalpost.

Hughes made several good rushes. The ice was a trifle sticky and the players frequently oversteered the puck.

Ypres Fast Team.
The speed of the Ypres players is now much in evidence, and the forwards are back-checking like demons. The westerners' defence has been steady and has kept the green-clad crew shooting long range. Seventeen minutes of the first period had elapsed when Leroux relieved Miller and Hainsworth went to right wing in place of "Chum" Irvin. Leroux was benched for hooking Hughes. His absence Darnell noticed the initial counter for Winnipeg on a pass from behind the Kitchener net by Alex Irvin. Darnell slipped the rubber into the net with his back to the goal. The gong sounded, ending the first period a moment later with Winnipeg leading by 1 to 0. Ypres had the better of the play during the initial frame. They appear to be faster skaters than Kitchener, and they are checking hard and close.

The spectators now hurried to cover up and the odds switched to 5 to 5, with Winnipeg favorites.

The second period commenced with Kitchener playing a man short. "Chum" Irvin was back at right wing, replacing Hainsworth. Parke was almost through when he was iced by Bostrom. The latter was promptly penalized. Miller returned when Leroux's penalty expired.

With Winnipeg playing five men to six, "Chum" Irvin rushed and noched the second goal for Winnipeg on a shot to the corner and from outside the defence. Time 2:00. Bostrom returned shortly after. The purple and black continued to press and Hainsworth was called upon to stop several hard shots. Owing to the immense crowd, the ice is becoming more sticky and the players are repeatedly over-steering the puck.

Kitchener Held Hand.
The play was more even for the next ten minutes. Parke and Solomon combined nicely, and with no one to beat but Winkler, Solomon scored first blood for Kitchener. Hughes and Alex Irvin were both chased for tripping in the succession. A moment later Miller followed. Despite this advantage, Kitchener was unable to score until both Ypres players returned. Miller came back as "Chum" Irvin was benched for leaving the Kitchener goal mouth. Hainsworth replaced Darnell, and tore off a beautiful rush, but Hainsworth stopped his shot. He and Kargues got mixing it too freely a moment later, and the latter was chased. Noble made a "foot" on the decision, as Hainsworth was holding Kargues' stick, and the officials was hooted by the crowd. There was no further scoring during the second period, which ended with Winnipeg up 2 to 1.

Kitchener commenced the final chapter on the aggressive, and Miller missed a pass right in front of Ypres' goal. Hughes shot wildly after a beautiful rush up the left wing.

Kargues Working Well.
Winnipeg staged another attack. Darnell took a pass from Hughes and beat Hainsworth with a beautiful shot to the corner for Ypres' third tally. Kitchener fought back gamely and on a hard shot Kargues again hit the Winnipeg goalpost. Alex Irvin was benched for tripping Miller. He returned as Parke was chased for hitting Bostrom with his stick. Kargues came clear through the Ypres defence. The game was in a dead-end, but Winkler came out and blocked him cleverly.

Parke received a gash in his left hand, but continued. Despite the water-covered ice in centre, the play continued fast, with Ypres displaying the better staying qualities.

On a pass from Parke Miller flipped the rubber in the corner of the net for Kitchener's second tally. With only one minute remaining to be played, Miller missed a beautiful chance for a goal in the dying seconds of the play.

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Last Game of National Scheduled For Tonight

The second game of the National League finals will be staged at the Jubilee Rink in Montreal tonight, when the Canadians go against the Toronto. The Frenchmen will have the advantage of playing on their own ice, but have a lead of four goals to overcome before the title comes within their reach.

In the first game at Toronto on Monday night, the Blues won because of their persistent back-checking and their bulldog attack. Both teams traveled faster speed from the face-off. They had their throats wide-open all the time. In the first period, Toronto checked the Frenchmen off their feet, and kept Vezina on the jump stopping their shots. His good work saved the Canadians from being defeated by a larger score.

Great Defence.
The Toronto showed great form, and if they can keep it up tonight, as they did on Monday evening, all will be well for them. Mummery and Cameron played a great defensive game. Repeatedly they broke up rushes by Malone, Pitre and Lalonde, and frequently robbed the attackers of the puck after stopping it and took it into the visitors' territory. Cameron astonished the fans by his fine stick-handling line.

While the general opinion of sport writers who saw the game is that the Blues were the best team from all angles on Monday night, it must not be thought that they had a cinch win. The Canadians are a formidable aggregation and will put up a terrific battle to win tonight.

Commenting on the teams the Ottawa Journal sporting editor, who has sized up both teams during the N. H. L. games in that city, placed a great deal of weight on the result of Monday night's game. In their Monday evening edition the Journal said:

"The Blues have played some pretty good hockey this winter, and might unexpectedly come through. Much will depend on how they make out tonight. Many look for them to win their home game, but lose out on the round when they play in Montreal. If they can run up a four or five goal lead in the first game their chances of winning will be excellent."

The Toronto made the four-goal lead necessary, according to the Ottawa writer, and would stand a good chance of winning on the round, even if they should be trimmed tonight.

However, concerning the players, he finds that the Canadians are the best on paper, at any rate. Just how near he is to being correct fans can figure out for themselves. He hopes it out in this manner:

HEARST IS FORCED TO AN ADJOURNMENT BY HARTLEY DEWART

Legislature Experiences Incident Not Recorded in a Quarter Century.

TORONTO, March 12.—The night session of the Legislature ended almost before it had begun tonight, when Hartley Dewart endeavored to move an amendment to the prime minister's motion to go into supply. Sir William Hearst explained that an agreement had been made with the Opposition leader that the House would spend the evening on the estimates. Mr. Proudfoot was not present, having received word that his son, Lieut. William Proudfoot, of the 15th Battalion of Canadian Infantry, had again been wounded in action.

The prime minister refused to allow Mr. Dewart to move his amendment, declaring that if there was any objection to the House going into supply he would move the adjournment. Probably not in a quarter of a century has such action been taken.

The member for Southwest Toronto did not intimate what his amendment was, but said he wished to discuss certain matters. The premier then carried out his threat to move the adjournment, and the members departed without doing any business, save for the second reading of two bills.

Some Conservative members were exceedingly angry with the member for Southwest Toronto. "We could have disposed of the estimates tonight but for the action of Mr. Dewart," they said after the House had adjourned.

Mr. Dewart, of course, was quite in order, but Sir William Hearst would not consent to the consideration of anything but the estimates, because of the arrangement made with the Opposition leader.

JOHN DILLON NAMED NATIONALIST LEADER, SUCCEEDING REDMOND

LONDON, March 12.—John Dillon, member of Parliament for East Mayo, was today unanimously elected chairman of the Nationalist party, succeeding the late John Redmond.

The motion to elect Mr. Dillon was made by Joseph Devlin.
