## HEARST IS FORCED TO AN ADJOURNMENT BY HARTLEY DEWART

Legislature Experiences Incident Not Recorded in a Quarter Century.

[Special to The Advertiser.] TORONTO, March 12.—The night ses-ion of the Legislature ended almost be-ore it had begun tonight, when Hartley fore it had begin tonight, when Hartley Dewart endeavored to move an amendment to the prime minister's motion to go into supply. Sir William Hearst explained that an agreement had been made with the Opposition leader that the House would spend the evening on the estimates. Mr. Proudfoot was not present, having received word that his son, Lieut. William Proudfoot, of the 15th Battalion of Canadian Infantry, had again been wounded in action.

The prime minister refused to allow Mr. Dewart to move his amendment, declaring that if there was any objection to the House going into supply he would move the adjournment.

The member for Southwest Toronto did not intimate what his amendment was, but said he wished to discuss certain matters.
