## CANADA'S FERTILE NORTHLAND.

The enormous resources of part of the unexplored regions of the Dominion were described in the evidence heard before a select committee of the Senate during last session, which, with the report of that committee, has just been published in book form by direction of the Minister of the Interior. Evidence bearing on the territory of Ungava is given by A. P. Low and Hon. W. C. Edwards; on the region west of Hudson Bay by A. P. Low, R. E. Young, F. J. Durnford, A. von Hoernerstein, Elihu Stewart, R. J. McConnell, D. B. Dowling, O. O'Sullivan, Wm. McInnes, H. A. Conroy, R. S. Cook, Ven. Archdeacon McKay, J. B. Tyrell, W. F. Bredin, F. S. Lawrence and J. K. Corwall; on the navigability of Hudson Bay by A. P. Low, J. B. Tyrell, Dr. Robert Bell and Commander Wakeham; and on the climate of Northern Canada by R. F. Stupart, while excellent illustrations throw light on portions of the country about which little is generally known.

The volume deals with the undeveloped natural wealth of those parts of the new Provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta lying north of the Saskatchewan watershed, with an area of 250,000 square miles; of Ungava, lying north of the Province of Quebec, 354,911 square miles in extent; of Keewatin, lying north of Ontario and Manitoba, covering an area of 470,416 square miles, and of Mackenzie, lying north of the Provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta and east of the Yukon territory, 562,182 square miles in extent, or a total of 1,637,559 square miles. This is by more than 300,000 square miles twice the combined area of the four original provinces of Confederation.

Summarized, the evidence goes to show that Ungava possesses a belt of iron-bearing rock, probably 100 miles long and 200 miles wide, leading to the belief that the Labrador peninsula will furnish a large supply of iron. The agricultural possibilities of Ungava are "great," but the fisheries throughout the territory are excellent and a good trade in furs is done. Summer begins in June and ends about Nov. 1: the winters are long and cold. As yet there are very few settlers in Ungava. At present the only means of communication is by canoe following the waterways. The Grand Falls at Hamilton Inlet are described as "one of the best water-powers in the known world."

In the region north of Lake Winnipeg there is an area of from 5,000 to 10,000 square miles of country adapted to agriculture. Some considerable sections of the southern and western portions of Keewatin promise to be agriculturally valuable, the climate there being fairly good for settlement. The inland fisheries of Keewatin are very valuable and there are very promising mineral deposits.

As regards the Great Mackenzie Basin, the vast region lying north of the Saskatchewan Valley and west of Keewatin, the evidence shows the country to be much more valuable than was at one time supposed, and capable of sustaining a very large and prosperous population. Mr. W. F. Bredin, a member of the Alberta Legislature, who lived many years in that country, estimated the area of available agricultural lands in Mackenzie and Northern Alberta at not less than 100,000,000 acres. Some 400 miles due north of Edmonton splendid crops of wheat, barley, oats, peas, etc., have been regularly raised for over 20 years, the product for the season of 1906 being 25,000 bushels. Modern grist mills of considerable capacity have been established. Potatoes and other vegetables have been for many years satisfactorily cultivated at Fort Good Hope, on the Mackenzie River, fourteen miles from the Arctic circle.

The evidence relating to the navigability of Hudson Bay and Hudson Strait, as an alternative means of communication with the northwestern regions of Canada is most interesting, witnesses giving the results of personal observations. Commander Wakeham has no doubt that when the strait is properly surveyed and lit it will render navigation safe, but that the climatic conditions are such that navigation cannot be expected there after the end of October.

While the question of climatic conditions in the far north country was under investigation the interesting fact was brought out that the isothermal lines west of Hudson Bay travel almost due north instead of east and west, as popularly supposed.

The maps and charts accompanying the volume are the least interesting features of this latest production of the Government printing bureau.

## THE SCANDAL-HUNTERS.

The Federal Opposition is acting on the assumption that the present session of Parliament is the last one before the general elections, hence its policy for the time being is, "Throw all the mud you can!" The muck-rakers are said to be rooting among the files and archives for material, with more industry than they usually devote to the public service. The so-called timber scandal, upon which they relied to make an impression upon the country, has flattened out. The only accusation was that men who had purchased a timber limit for a few thousand dollars were asking half a million for it. There is no record that anybody is willing to pay them that amount. Not a single limit has been sold by the Government without due advertisement of the sale. The public domain has not been given away to members of Parliament and party favorites, as was the case under the former regime, which alienated 20,000 square miles of timber lands in a period of three years, and received not so much as a postage stamp for it. No wonder the Montreal Star, a candid friend of the Conservative party, tells the Opposition that it should have removed "the wounded soldiers" from its firing line before attacking the Government on this question. One after another, Conservative members—wounded soldiers—had to rise to explain their timber deals in the past.

There has been much reckless insinuation, and the Conservative press has bloomed with sensational headlines, but the only result has been to reopen a chapter of Conservative Government which contrasts most unfavorably with the present Government's record. Moreover, before this alleged scandal was exploited, the Minister of the Interior had decided to improve on the tender system, introduced by a Conservative Government, by requiring all timber limits to be sold at public auction.

## GERMANY TURKEY'S ALLY.

The cable dispatches announcing Germany's change of face in regard to Macedonia revive interest in a question that is always disturbing to European diplomacy. For over a year what is known as the European concert has been pressing the Porte for a series of necessary judicial reforms in Macedonia, involving the supervision of the Turkish courts by European inspectors. As a result of Germany's open avowal of sympathy with Turkey's so-called reform, scheme, and Austria-Hungary's apathy, due, it is supposed, to certain railway concessions granted by the Porte, it would seem that all hope of effective coercion by the concert is destroyed. It is said that Britain and Russia, supported by France and possibly by Italy, will enter into an agreement for joint action, but it is doubtful whether this new combination will prove any more effective than the concert which has just been broken.

Meanwhile the situation in Macedonia continues as bad as ever. In a note to the powers reviewing European action to the close of 1907, the Balkan committee in London says the effect of the reform scheme of 1903 on Macedonia itself has been disastrous in the million and a half inhabitants, says the committee, "over ten thousand people have been murdered since 1902. Nationalist forces from outside Macedonia terrorize villages in order to effect political conversions, while the Turkish troops raid indiscriminately. There is a vast stream of emigration, so that in Central Macedonia in many villages there are hardly any able-bodied males left, but only women and children." In suggesting a remedy, the committee says it is universally recognized that but for the opposition of certain powers, "the concert could secure for the financial commission and the gendarmerie officers a real executive control. If the European officers took over the command of the troops," the note continues, "and were responsible to the European commission only, they could speedily suppress the bands and restore security for life and property, which are immediate practical necessities." A more effective remedy would be the suppression of the Greek, Bulgarian and Serbian bands, which are always at war. So long as strife continues among those Christian factions, Turkey will not want for an excuse for misrule in the Balkans. As it is the problem seems farther than ever from solution.

A blind mare may have been palmed off on the Ontario department of agriculture, but it will not be made a public issue. The Liberals have been sufficiently warned against such tactics by the fate of an Opposition which rode the calf with a cough.

The publication at this season of the annual reports of the loan and insurance companies, with headquarters in this city, calls attention to the importance of London as a financial center. There is no city outside of Montreal and Toronto that can compare with it in this respect.

Mark G. Levy, of the Maiden Lane jewelry firm of Freudenheim Brothers & Levy, looked at the culprit in silence. Levisohn had once been a business associate of the man who charged him with theft.

When Levisohn failed in business, his fellow merchants said it was due to his being too conscientious. They believed him the soul of honesty and fairness. They prized his skill as a diamond expert. He could name every stone in the market, and it was impossible to deceive him as to value. Hence he did not lack employment.

The firm of Freudenheim Brothers & Levy considered itself lucky to get him.

But the sales of diamonds he was expected to make did not materialize. Mr. Levy began an investigation and he found that Levisohn had pawned fully \$18,000 worth of samples.

Levisohn, in the meantime, had fled to Chicago, but when an agent of the New York firm in that city traced him there, he did not deny it. Mr. Levy, in New York, then secured a
