HONEY SCARCE, BUT PROMISE OF CLOVER SEED IS EXCELLENT

Farmers are Advised Against Plowing Clover Under This Year.

Owing to a misunderstanding on the part of the reporter, D. Anguish, the well known bee farmer of Lambeth, was quoted in a recent interview as saying honey was going to be plentiful this year, because the bees were taking so well to the clover.

This is quite contrary to the fact, as he believes of plowing clover under this season. Some years they have been disappointed when holding it for seed, and this has led them to give up hope of profit from letting it go to seed. The dry weather, however, has not stunted the heads of the clover, shortening them and thus making it possible for the bees to reach the nectar. This invariably leads to pollinating and an increase in seed, so that Mr. Anguish feels sure this seed will be a bountiful and profitable crop.

Bee-keepers have been anxious as to their winter supply of sugar and have written the food control board asking that consideration be given them. They have received a reply promising this, but the weather may help them to save the sugar, and aid conservation, which they are eager to do. During the week the bees have been gaining rapidly in their winter hoarding of honey, and if this gain is maintained for a week or two little sugar will be required.

OFFICERS OF NEW UNION INSTALLED

FORECASTS DRIVE IN TWO MONTHS BY GERMANS TO GET SHAM PEACE

Dr. Frank Bohn Says They Would Grasp Russia as Allies Looked West.

BUILD A NEW MACHINE

American Returns From Europe To Expose Enemy Plans for Next War.

"Within sixty days will see the greatest stroke Germany has yet played, a concentrated effort to save the last remnants of her empire will be made in the peace terms she will offer, terms so liberal and so enticing that every nation and every weak-kneed pacifist from Lansdowne up to Lloyd George will be lulled with a dramatic telling force Dr. Frank Bohn at the Chautauqua meeting last night declared that the German menace the world has known for the last years will be a historical detail compared with the Germany that will arise from the ashes of this war, should the Allies yield to any climax but a victory by force of arms.

In Germany During War. This keen historian and no less eloquent orator has as recently as two months ago been in Switzerland, in close contact with Germans living there whose sympathies were with the Allies cause, and whose desire is to see Germany completely defeated, in order that a new nation may be created on the principles of democracy, that the people may be saved from the political and industrial atmosphere of the country.

The Three Divisions. In broad outlines the address had three main points:—failure in Germany during the revolution of 1848, and the death-blow that was then given to the German Empire; the industrial revolution in succession the different European nations; secondly, the determination of Germany to expand eastward industrially and politically; and thirdly, the protection that Germany would within the next two months offer a sham peace that would be for the sake of a new and powerful empire, built from shattered remnants of Russia, seized by Prussia, and becoming a threat to the Allies looked the other way, to the west.

Germany's proffer, said Dr. Bohn, will be peace on the western front, involving on her part the restoration of Belgium, Poland, indemnity to Serbia, cession of Alsace-Lorraine to France, and billions of money to make good ravaged fields and ruined areas. In return, Germany will ask that Russia, the defunct, be given back to the Allies, and that the scheme go through.
