

The second appropriation will make a total of \$800,000 for housing purposes in London. Mr. Dennis estimates that only about \$500,000 in all will have been spent when building activities come to an end this year, however. The first appropriation of \$400,000 at 5 per cent interest is all required for building which is now under way, and at least \$100,000 more will be needed. The remaining \$300,000 will be available if it is decided to continue the building mext year. This second loan will be at current rates of interest and will be used in building the more expensive houses.

NEW YORK CITY IN SEVEN MONTHS

New York, Aug. 4.—Fifty-two murders have been committed in New York City during the seven months since January 1, setting a homicide record unparalleled in many previous years, it was announced last night at the district attorney's office. The death list includes the mysterious murder of Joseph B. Elwell, wealthy turfman and whist expert. In the six convictions returned in these cases, none has been for murder in the first degree. In 16 of the 52 murders no arrests have been made.

STILL A CHANCE
