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POLICEMAN WINS SUIT
NOT A CITY EMPLOYEE

Andrew Ross Fails to Convince Jury He Should Receive Damages For False Arrest.

HAMILTON, Jan. 14.—(Special.)—Andrew Ross lost his suit against Constable Emmerson and the city for \$100 damages for alleged wrongful arrest. Justice Galt dismissed the action against the city, holding that the constable did, as the constable was not an employee of the city, but was employed by the police commissioners, a body independent of the control of the city council. The suit against the constable went to the jury, who found in his favor. Mr. Ross began the suit because he claimed that constable had arrested, ill-treated him, and refused to give his name to the officer. The officer's defence was that when he demanded Mr. Ross's name, because that gentleman's dog was parading the streets contrary to a city bylaw, that Mr. Ross not only refused to tell his name but threatened him. He admitted placing the handcuffs on Mr. Ross, but denied that he put him in the hold.

Bank Suit Settled.
The action brought by the Bank of Hamilton, against Wm. O. Jackson, formerly manager of the bank's branch at Minnedosa, Man., and now manager of the Traders Bank, Ripley, for \$299 on a guarantee was settled after being partially tried. The suit was started because the bank claimed it had on the approval of Mr. Jackson, and the bank's solicitor, given Mr. Jackson permission to extend credit to Jno. Barry, \$2,500 secured by only a note of \$500, and a \$1000 endorsement policy. Barry was arrested on the charge of fraud and the bank claimed that after he was committed for defence was sponged.

78TH ANNUAL REPORT

Bank of Nova Scotia Makes Its Usual Significant Showing.

The seventy-eighth annual report of the Bank of Nova Scotia has been issued, and is highly complimentary to those who are in direct touch with the institution. The absolute profits for the year were \$804,122.37, or nearly 20 per cent. on the paid-up capitalization. The strength of the institution is its reserve, which is \$5,900,000, against its capital of \$3,000,000, which has long been commented upon in connection with the Canadian chartered banks, and is a little to add to this fact to say that \$100,000 of the profits of last year were added to the reserve fund.

The deposits of the bank are now upwards of \$4,000,000 in excess of those shown in the last statement. The total assets of the bank are \$48,359,366.00, against \$47,446,648.00 a year ago.

Operations of the bank are in accord with the growth of the districts which it serves and show that the management is alive to the obligations which are owed under their charter.

This bank's reserve fund now stands at 180½ per cent. premium over the capitalization.

One of the prominent features in connection with the annual report is the publication of the list of investments which the bank gives in its annual report.

WOULD MURDER FAMILY WITH TYPHOID GERMS

Sensational Theory to Account For Illness of Several Members—Plot to Exterminate Heirs.

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 14.—"An arrest probably will be made in a few days," said John H. Atwood, an attorney for the Swope family to-day, regarding the investigation of the death of Colonel Thomas H. Swope, an aged philanthropist, and his heirs.

Col. Swope's death on Oct. 3, was at first attributed to apoplexy, but a quick succession of deaths and illness among heirs of the Swope estate led to an investigation, culminating in the exhuming of the body of Col. Swope, and the submitting of his stomach to chemical analysis.

Fees From Fish.

Ontario has received in revenue from special fishing licenses during the 10 months of the fiscal year just ended \$74,797.78. Of this sum \$507.78 comes from Lake Huron, \$233.33 from the north channel of Lake Huron, \$571.98 from Georgian Bay, \$511.08 from Lake Huron and St. Clair River, \$400.00 from Lake St. Clair, and the Thames and Detroit Rivers, \$36,672.82 from Lake Erie and the Grand River, and \$629.22 from Lake Ontario and the Bay of Quinte.

The total number of permits is over 7000, the fees ranging from \$1 to \$3000. Renewals are now being issued.
