Wheat—There was only a feeble response in the Liverpool market to our advance of yesterday and the Pittsburg bank failure caused some selling pressure on the opening advance. Best buyers yesterday again took the offerings to-day, but the market seemed devoid of vitality. Argentine shipments 428,000, against 178,000 last year, but Indian shipments were estimated at only 378,000. The Indian crop promises to be materially short of an average and should play an important part in calculations as to the world's available supply. The most potent influence of the day was a message from Minneapolis, stating that interior elevator stocks were only 12,000,000 bushels v. 40,000,000 bushels last year, and that under such conditions there was no probability of Minneapolis being able to accumulate a proper supply of milling wheat for the next few months. Canadian markets were higher most of the day and outside markets closed about unchanged. There was a very slow cash and export demand for wheat, but the 0 131/4
