

ORANGES WERE CHIEF RECEIPTS YESTERDAY

Choice Floridas Arrived on Wholesale and Sold at Three-Twenty-Five a Case.

DECLINE IN TOMATOES

Strawberries Were Plentiful on Market and Brought Forty Cents Per Box.

Oranges were the chief receipts on the wholesale market yesterday. Two cars of extra choice Floridas coming in, and selling at \$2.25 to \$2.50 per case, had three cars of navel oranges, selling at \$3 to \$4 per case.

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BUSINESS WAS GOOD WITH STEADY PRICES

Not Many Choice Butchers' Cattle on Sale at Stock Yards Yesterday.

HOG VALUES FIRMER

Was Great Demand for Milksters, Springers, Sheep, Lambs and Calves.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards on Tuesday, Feb. 9, were 1463 hogs, 210 sheep and lambs and 65 calves.

There were several loads of cattle that came in late on Tuesday that were not offered for sale, which counted with the receipts would make about 1150 on sale.

While trade was good, it was not quite as brisk as on Tuesday, but prices remained steady. Buyers accounted for the less activity, as being due to the higher values demanded by the stock yards. There were not many good to choice lots on sale, the bulk again being common and medium.

Stockers and Feeders.—It will be seen by the sales given that stockers of all weights of hogs, high priced, are quoted; steers of 750 to 800 lbs., at \$7.75 to \$8.00; milkers and springers, \$8.00 to \$8.50; calves, \$6.00 to \$7.00.

Milkers and Springers.—The demand for these was good and prices remained firm. See sales reported below.

Stocks and Feeders.—Less than 100 calves sold at very firm values, but there was not enough to go around the many buyers.

Sheep and Lambs.—Both of these classes were in great demand at firmer values, when quality is considered. One lot of lambs reached \$12.25; they were black faces, and were sold at the top price of the day by Eddie Zeigman to the Swift Canadian Company.

Hogs.—Altogether there was a liberal supply, prices were firmer, and more would have found ready buyers.
