The commission decided upon playing a mine-game series to decide the title in the baseball classic. The schedule, as drawn, gives the American League the first three games, while the National League gets the next four. The eighth game, if necessary, will be played on American League grounds, and a ninth game would be played on National League grounds. The question of the ninth game was decided upon thru the toss of a coin, in which the National League won with the call of "tails." Two newspaper men were called in to the meeting, which was an executive session, to act as witnesses of this tossone to make the toss and the other to read the coin after it fell.

For the first time in 15 years a familiar face was missing at the meeting. August (Garry) Herrmann, president of the Cincinnati Reds, and for years chairman of the National Commission, was not present, having resigned the position last fall. In his stead, John E. Bruce, secretary of the commission, acted as chairman, with President B. B. Johnson representing the American League and President John. Heydler the National League.
