## Financia and Commercial

WANT TO DISTRIBUTE  
TO THE OUTSIDERS

The Next Week May Bring Unfavorable Surprise in the Stock Market Though to the Professional Eye the Outlook is Tolerably Satisfactory.

(New York Commercial).

As was expected and predicted by all observers of market conditions who clearly discerned the fact that the powerful combination of banking interests behind the August bull movement had not lifted prices far enough to suit its purposes, there was no reason Saturday, despite the loss in surplus reserves reported by the associated banks. On the contrary, questions advanced, and the session witnessed a general betterment—the controlling consideration being the widespread belief that the current week would mark the beginning of considerable importations of gold. This, beyond question, is the issue that dwarfs all others. The surplus reserves on Saturday stood below \$3,000,000. It was not a deficit by any means, and the case was one where a miss was as good as a mile. But conditions are precarious, and it is quite likely that the next ten days may bring unfavorable surprises. The conservative operator will be inclined to limit his commitments strictly and will keep in mind the all-important fact that the great objective of the men now dominant is to distribute to the "outsider" a large fraction of their holdings. This purpose is not necessarily illegitimate; and the men leading the present movement are entitled, all things considered, to a goodly share of public confidence. They have proved themselves capable of the greatest achievements in construction and administration; and so far as respectability is concerned, they are as hyperion to a satyr compared with the rascals who managed the bull movement last winter. There are others, and not a few who regard the average as fairly measuring national property and as several points below the level which would represent a fair capitalization of the business of the next two years. Amid this diversity of longes the cautious trader will be apt to take his chances among securities which manifestly have not shared to an equitable degree in the prosperity of the properties they represent.

To the professional eye, however, the outlook is tolerably satisfactory, and a speedy resumption of the activity of the early part of last week is expected.
