## Legality of Sunday Baseball

Ottawa, Ont., July 9.—The interest of organized baseball promoters, particularly those of the International and Canadian Leagues, will centre next week in the hearing of the Ottawa Baseball Club directors and players on a charge of violating the Lord's Day Act by conducting a game in Hull on Sunday, May 23. Knotty Lee and the officers of the Quebec club are co-defendants, as their team opposed the Senators during the match in question.  
The charge was laid by the Lord's Day Alliance Association, through Messrs. Honeywell, Caldwell and Wilson, their Ottawa representatives. The defendants are Malcolm Bryce, F. Shaughnessy and J. Gorman, owners of the Ottawa Club; also Pete Powers and Arthur Laje, players, together with Knotty Lee, Bobby Auld and Matt Kiley. The case will come up at Hull on Thursday or Friday of next week.  
In the event of the prosecution of the Ottawa being successfully carried out, the Lord's Day Alliance Association will force its guns on Montreal, the stronghold of the International, in an effort to stop Sunday baseball there, in both the International and City Leagues. The attorney-general of Quebec gave his consent to the prosecution, and the Lord's Day Alliance people announced that they would fight the matter to a finish. Summons were issued to the Ottawa owners last season, but the case fell through on a technicality. The Montreal club and the International League will likely have a lawyer on hand to watch the proceedings. President Fitzgerald recently said that the Canadian League was being made the "goal" by the Sunday observance agitators, but it is evident that if successful here, the alliance will enter action at Montreal.

## Johnson Buys Smokes for Tommy.

Jack Johnson is now in London and spending money for cigarettes to be sent to English soldiers. He has already bought more than \$5,000 for Tommy Atkins and intends to keep doing that while the thing for some time to come.  
The other day he was approached on the subject of the best possible opponent for Jess Willard.

"That's not an easy question to answer," said the former champion, "but taking everything into account, I should say Moran, at the moment. He is big enough himself not to be worried overmuch by Willard's bulk, and as a boxer I should say he is a bit in front of Jess."

The names of Young Ahern and Carpenter were brought as possible opponents for Willard, but in those Jack saw no chance. He did not think them big enough, and when the other boxing men were brought up, he said: "Oh, yes, that is all very well in its way; and, of course, I know you could name plenty of names, such as Charlie Mitchell, for instance, in support of the argument. But I'm bound to say I think 154 pounds is not a big weight when the other fellow in the ring is clever as well as big. The men about the size of Willard, who have big events against heavier men have been exceptionally fine, and I think you may have a touch of genius about most of them. And those sort of exceptions only go to prove the general rule, after all."

## Will Continue to Play.

London, July 9.—Whether the war is concluded or not before September 1, soccer will be played throughout the British Isles, and a special meeting held today at Blackpool by the governing bodies of England, Scotland, Wales and Ireland, decided to carry out the usual schedule of league games. This is entirely with the approval of the government.  
The Scottish League season will commence on August 14, while the English and other leagues will kick off on September 1.  
It has been agreed by all the clubs that players must be workers for the government in order that no scandal may attach to the game that it enables able-bodied men to live without doing their share of the nation's work.

## MOTOR BOAT.

Long Distance Race Postponed.  
Owing to the high winds and sea the long distance motor boat race, under the auspices of the R. K. Y. C., which was to have been held on the river Saturday, was postponed. The smaller boats could not get from Indianapolis and there were to be nineteen boats to enter the race, the judges decided to postpone the event until after the R. K. Y. C. cruise, which is scheduled for next Saturday.

## RUNNING.

Taber Wins Fast Mile Race.  
New York, July 11.—Norman S. Taber, of Oxford University, England, competing for the Boston A. A., won the one-mile handicap run at Celtic Park Saturday in 4:17.85, the fastest mile ever run on that track. Taber, running from scratch, gave sixty yards to the men who finished second and third. He won by a margin of seventy yards.

## GOLF.

Wings Woodpecker With Ball.  
George Cook Wiehl, son of a St. Joseph, Mo., banker, performed a feat on the links of the Country club the other day that puts him in a golfing class by himself.  
Wiehl was playing with two friends. When he drove from the fifth tee the ball sailed through the air fifty yards and then struck a woodpecker flying in the opposite direction and killed the bird instantly.

The golfer continued playing, and nothing peculiar was observed until Wiehl prepared to drive to the next green. Then he noticed there was something wrong with the ball. He found that the bird's beak had become imbedded in the sphere, inserted half an inch, with a quarter of an inch protruding. Wiehl put the ball in his pocket and substitute a new one. He will have it framed and hung in the trophy room of the club.

Will Not Challenge England.  
Chicago, July 10.—It would not be sportsmanlike for America polo players to send a challenge to England for the International Polo Trophy within fifteen years, according to Foxhall Keene, here to referee the Western polo championship tourney.

"England took the cup away in fair play," he said. "Of the army players who did it one or two have been killed and others wounded.
