BANK CASHIER WHO PLEADED GUILTY TO EMBEZZLEMENT

Wider, the 25-year-old cashier of the Trust Company Bank agency in this city, who was enabled to steal, according to the other officers of the institution, securities valued at \$600,000, has been apprehended and is now in the Tombs, indicted for grand larceny, he was arrested three hours later, was taken to police headquarters, then to the criminal court building, where Judge Foster, at a general session, fined him \$25,000. Unable to find a bondsman, the young man had to go to prison.

NEW YORK DOCTOR SWEARS HE WAS FORCED TO WED

Threatened With \$50,000 Suit and Criminal Action on He Gave His House as Security

New York, Aug. 6.—A suit in which \$50,000 was demanded by the wife of a doctor, who was granted by Justice Ford, to Mrs. Annie Zarch, wife of Dr. Isaac Zarch, of No. 188 Livingston street, Manhattan, reveals a strange story. The action was started last Spring by Zarch, to have his marriage annulled, and he claimed in his complaint that he was forced to marry the young woman with force, made out to Henry L. Rupert and Isaac Schmitt (the former had \$100,000) for his house, No. 192 East Third street, valued at \$10,000, which, in the event of his not fulfilling the agreement, would be sold and the money turned over to the girl. Subsequently, after the doctor had married the girl, the property was handed back to him.

YOUNG WIDOW LOSES IN FIRST SKIRMISH OF LEGAL BATTLE

New York, Aug. 6.—In what promises to be a long drawn out legal battle over the \$100,000 estate of Charles A. Constant, who died June 1 last, between his daughter, Mrs. Jennie Constant Mason, and the young widow, Mrs. Margaret R. Constant, the daughter secured a second victory in the first skirmish Thursday, when her youthful stepmother was obliged to leave the handsome home in the possession of Mrs. Mason.

CANADA'S REVENUE HAS INCREASED \$5,000,000 IN FIRST FOUR MONTHS

A Net Betterment of That Amount Over the Same Period Last Year—A Fine Showing

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 6.—(Special)—For the first four months of the present fiscal year, Canada's revenue shows an increase of \$5,025,148 over the corresponding period of last year. For the same period the expenditure on revenue account increased by \$1,228,061, while capital expenditure decreased by \$69,884, leaving a net betterment of over five millions.
