

Candidates Comment On Election Results

Comments on the result of Tuesday's general election by the various candidates, successful and otherwise, in response to requests from The Telegraph-Journal and Times-Star, seem to indicate that, although the number who turned out to vote were less than in former elections, the workers were better organized on both sides than in the last election and the contests were bitterly fought in nearly all constituencies. Although the fight was strenuous in every riding it seems to have been carried on good-naturedly between the workers of opponents in every instance, no reports to the contrary having been received from any part of the province.

Outstanding among the comments were those of Hon. George B. Jones, successful Conservative candidate in Royal, and Hon. P. J. Veniot, successful Liberal candidate in Gloucester. The former greatly regretted the defeat of Premier Meighen whom he referred to as the outstanding statesman in the Dominion today, but hoped that the Liberals would have enough strength in the House to do their best for the country. Hon. Mr. Veniot felt that the Liberal cause was vindicated and was particularly pleased with the solid liberal front from the North Shore.

The comments as received follow:

GLoucester

Hon. P. J. Veniot, former Liberal Premier of the province, and successful candidate in Gloucester county, wires as follows:

Bathurst, Sept. 15, 1926

"Telegraph-Journal, Sept. 15, 1926

"I consider a general result of election throughout Canada as reported today a complete triumph of Liberal policies and a decided rebuke to the campaign of slander carried on by Conservative leaders in various provinces. I am pleased that Liberal party will now be able to give the country stable government and thus place our industrial life on a sound business basis. A solid Liberal North Shore gives me great satisfaction.

ROYAL

In a statement given over the long distance telephone by Hon. George B. Jones, successful Conservative candidate in Royal, Hon. Mr. Jones spoke as follows:

"After the battle at the polls on Sept. 14 and the subsidence of election excitement, I wish to say that I never saw the opposition so active at the polls as on yesterday.

"The splendid vote accorded myself, after 19 years of service, is a vindication from the electors. It was obtained in spite of a bitter campaign waged against me by my opponents.

"The personal defeat of the Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen is very regrettable. There is no doubt but that he is the greatest statesman in public life in Canada. His defeat is not a verdict of policy for the country but one of sectional interest.

"I hope that the King party will have a clear majority and endeavor to do something in the interests of the Maritime Provinces and Canada in general."

In commenting on the results of the election, Dr. D. H. McAllister, of Sussex, unsuccessful Liberal candidate in Royal, stated over long distance telephone as follows:

"I am greatly pleased with the general results at the polls yesterday throughout the Dominion in favor of the Right Hon. Mackenzie King, other than in the Maritime Provinces which, I think, should have given the Liberal party more support than they did. To my mind the Maritimes will be as much if not more benefited by supporting the Liberal party, than any other province in the Dominion. Ontario has proved at the polls that the reduction on agricultural implements and autos, etc., does not hurt them in

any way but is rather beneficial and, also, Ontario is showing better feeling towards the Liberal party.

"Royal has made a mistake again at the polls yesterday. There are reasons for this besides the reduction of tariff and the Robt budget and those reasons, I think I can safely say, are money and misrepresentation and whispering canvasses which will sometimes influence any electorate against their own interests."

A wire from Charles J. Morrissey, of Newcastle, Liberal, successful candidate in Northumberland, reads as follows:

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
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
