GORMAN'S RECORD  
HAS BEEN ALLOWED

The time of 37.9 seconds made in the 440 yards skating race at Lake Placid (N. Y.) by Charles Gorman, of St. John, on February 9, 1921, has been officially allowed as a world's record for the distance, it was announced in a telegram received here from Julian T. Fitzgerald, of Chicago, president of the International Skating Association, by a member of the Y. M. C. I. committee which is in charge of the Canadian national outdoor skating championships to be held here on Wednesday and Thursday of next week.

When Gorman turned in this performance some question arose as to whether the time had not been previously bettered, but subsequent searching of the records failed to reveal any faster time in such a race so Gorman was duly credited with the record.

While the investigation of the records was being carried on, the diamond medal which was awarded to record-breakers and which was won by Gorman was held up, but it now is expected that before long he will receive this emblem of his world's record performance.
