LOCAL NEWS
BARNARDO BOYS ON BOARD.
The C. P. O. S. liner Sicilian is en route to St. John from Liverpool. She is bringing a large passenger list in addition to mails and general cargo. Included in the passengers are 300 Barnardo boys, who are going to Ontario points where they will enter the homes and secure employment. This is the first time since the outbreak of the war that any boys from Dr. Barnardo's institution have been brought to Canada.

THE ROBERT CANN FLOATED.
The steamer Robert Cann, which runs between here and Yarmouth and which grounded on Net Ledge at the entrance of Canoe Harbor on March 18, was refloated on last Saturday by the tug Lacanadienne, according to advices received at a local shipping office yesterday afternoon. A survey to ascertain the damage sustained is being made at Canoe.

INSPECTION OF 62ND.
The inspection of the 62nd regiment of the St. John Fusiliers will be made this week at the armory by Brigadier General A. H. Macdonnell, C. M. G., D. S. O., officer commanding military district No. 7. The parade will be in drill order and in addition to the inspection of the officers and men the books of the regiment will be gone over to see if they are complete. The accounts of the regiment will also be inspected.

Mr. and Mrs. Ferris have the best wishes of a host of friends. They will reside in West St. John.

WARNING ABOUT STREET NUMBERS
City Gives Two Months' Notice and Will Then Prosecute if Law Is Not Observed.

Commissioner Fisher reported this morning to the council on the matter of a complaint from the St. John Medical Society regarding the non-compliance with the city by-law covering the numbering of houses. He said that the enforcing of this law was dropped during the war, but that the matter should now be taken up vigorously and he asked the council to name a time of warning after which offenders would be prosecuted. It was decided to give two months' warning and after that date all house owners would be required to have street numbers affixed.

The common clerk read the section applying to street numbers. It required the owner of the house to have placed at each entrance the consecutive number assigned to it by the city engineer. In the cases of vacant lands, twenty feet is allowed for each number. The letters are to be at least one and a quarter inches in height and to be of a conspicuous color. Offences against the law are punishable by a fine of \$1 per day until the law is complied with. In the case of renewable leases, the tenant is obliged to carry out the law. Any information as to the proper number of the house is available from the city engineer.

Commissioner Bullock remarked that the public was ignorant of many of the by-laws and suggested that they be printed in pamphlet form. He was advised that they already exist in that form and can be obtained from the common clerk.

BUOYS REPLACED

Aberdeen Also Reports Sighting Mast With Rigging Off Cape Sable.

J. C. Chesley, agent for the Marine & Fisheries Department, received a message this morning from the captain of the government steamer, Aberdeen, saying that he had observed the Blonde Rock buoy, Pease Island buoy and others in the vicinity of Cape Sable. He also said that while proceeding Blonde Rock buoy yesterday he saw a mast with rigging attached partly submerged off Cape Sable. He said he would try to secure it on his way back.

GARVIN'S VIEWS ON THE FUTURE OF LLOYD GEORGE
(Canadian Press)

London, March 23.—J. I. Garvin, discussing in The Observer Premier Lloyd George's political future, says that the premier is convinced that with better organization for the coalition the recent course of the by-elections could be reversed and if the confidence of the country were so demonstrated the premier would prefer to postpone the dissolution for a couple of seasons. He would then appeal to the country with the biggest programme of achieved work behind him but any parliament has ever accomplished and with an equally strong programme for the future.

Mr. Garvin, discussing what the Unionists are prepared to do to help the premier to carry Liberal opinion, thinks the crux will come on licensing matters. He urges Unionists to concede local option, which does not mean "pussyfootism."

DREDGING IN BATHURST.
Northern Light.—Captain H. A. Tufts, who will be in charge of the dredging operations in Bathurst harbor this season, arrived this week to take over the craft. He was accompanied by Ern Long of Richibucto, who will officiate as mate on the dredge. Captain Swin, captain of the tug Canoe, arrived in town this week from St. John.
