Commissioner Fisher Meets Same Fate as Predecessors in Public Works Office  
—Messrs. Harding, Nevins, Mayes and Logan Also Drop Out—Large  
Vote was Polled—Proposal to Tax Abutters for Permanent Paving is De-  
feated Overwhelmingly.

The results show that Messrs. Thornton, Campbell, McLellan and Frink, in the order named, will be the contestants for office in the final two weeks hence when the majority candidates will also be voted upon.

Quite a number of citizens gathered at City Hall last night to hear the returns as announced by the common clerk. Commissioner Thornton was the only candidate present. He gave a short address of thanks.

The Labor candidate, Mr. Campbell, was in the Union Hall, Union street, and his friends thronged the place. He gave an address as did J. L. McInerney, J. E. Tighe, P. Sharkey, A. Corbet, Councilor J. T. O'Brien, and others.

## TEACHERS TO SCHOOL BOARD

Letter Read at Meeting Last Night—Resolution of Regret at Death of J. V. Russell.

At a meeting of the board of school trustees last evening a letter was read from the Teachers' Association thanking the board for increases granted, but saying that the schedule was below what had been asked. The letter was referred back to the finance committee.

A communication from Fletcher Peacock, director of vocational training, was received asking as to the term of office of the vocational training committee. It was left with the chairman and secretary.

On motion of Mr. Day the visitors to Winter street school were empowered to engage an architect for repairs if they thought it necessary as it was in bad shape in some parts.

A letter from the Teachers' Association while it thanked the board for increases of salaries granted the teachers said that the maximum of the schedule of salaries was \$200 below what had been asked and time service did not receive sufficient recognition in the schedule.

The association asked for a meeting of the finance committee of the board with a delegation from its membership. The board left the matter to the finance committee to report back. Several other matters of business were discussed.

Chairman, Dr. A. F. Emery presided and other members present were Mrs. E. R. Taylor, Mrs. R. O'Brien, H. C. Smith, George E. Day, G. Herbert Green, Dr. H. S. Bridges, superintendent of the schools, and Secretary A. Gordon Leavitt.

Applications for positions on the executive staff were received from Miss Anita J. A. Gallagher, Tracey Station; Miss Louise Scott, Fredericton; John B. Young (manual training), Oromocto; Miss Hester G. L. Sleep, Fredericton; Miss Nellie Loudon, Ontario, and Donald D. MacLean, Bertha, Britain.

The board thanked the board for leave of absence. A communication regarding a salary increase from an individual teacher was referred to the finance committee.

Secretary's Report.

The secretary's report, which was received, gave the following statistics: Pupils enrolled, 8,251; belonging boys, 8,570; girls, 4,081; total, 7,951; per centage attending, 87.97; average daily attendance, 72.29; percentage belonging in attendance, 91.29; those not belonging, but accounted for, as follows: died, 5; sick, 18; at work, 1; left city, 51; transferred, 16; kept at home, 60; total 800. The report of the board of health incorporated in the secretary's report enumerated the following cases of illness among the scholars: Influenza, 1; diphtheria, 9; scarlet fever, 16.

Upon all questions which came before the board he brought to bear a fairness of judgment that commanded and won the respect of his associate members."

"During his membership Mr. Russell exerted every effort towards procuring for the city a class of school buildings which should be better equipped and made in accord with the demands of modern education."

"His admirable qualities of mind and heart endeared him to his fellow trustees who feel his death almost as a personal loss."

"The board wish further to extend to the daughter of the deceased their sincere sympathy in her deep trouble."

The secretary was asked to send a copy of the resolution to Mr. Russell's daughter.

Mr. Smith, as a member of the finance committee, appointed to meet the male teachers and discuss salaries said that the meeting had taken place and that the male teachers had stated their intention of reporting their stand in the matter to a full meeting of the board.

## MANY SEEK TO ENTER CANADIAN AIR FORCE

Fifty to Sixty Applications a Day From Ex-Officers of R. A. F.

Ottawa, April 12.—Applications are coming in at the office of the Air Board at the rate of fifty and sixty a day for enlistment in the new Canadian Air Force. All the applications are from ex-officers in the Royal Air Force.

Preparations are already under way at Camp Borden, Ont., for the establishment of the first training camp of the force. Officers of the force will train at Camp Borden in periods of a month or so. There are adequate facilities there for the training of nearly three thousand men at a time. The equipment installed by the Royal Air Force at Camp Borden has been taken over by the Canadian government for the use of the Canadian Air Force, including eighteen hangars and substantial permanent buildings. The building of this flying base cost the Imperial government \$1,000,000, and comprises an up-to-date air-drome and barracks.
