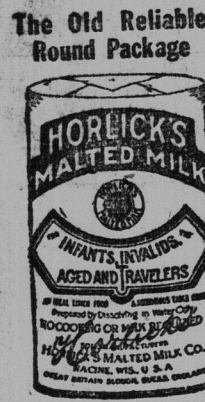

This is undoubtedly the first time that a St. John man has been awarded the Military Cross. Major Mackay is now officer commanding the 12th Siege Battery, Canadian, and ranks high among the large number of capable artillery officers that have come from New Brunswick, particularly the St. John men. Another brother, Captain Ray Mackay, was killed in action some time ago while still another member of the family, Major Malcolm Mackay, is still in France on active service.

STORIES OF TUNISIAN VOYAGE CONTRADICTORY

The large party of returning soldiers who arrived in this port Saturday morning on the C. P. O. S. liner Tunisian, were given a hearty welcome when the steamer docked at Sand Point. Various committees were on hand to distribute candy, cigarettes, etc. to the boys and the Depot Battalion Band rendered eagerly and patriotic selections as the boat pulled into her pier. Among the societies represented were St. Monica's, St. Vincent's Alumnae and the Catholic Girls' Guild, also Brunswick Chapter I. O. O. F. and Y. M. C. A. secretaries.
