METAL AND MACHINERY

In its summary of the iron, steel, metal and machinery markets for week ended July 12, Canadian Machinery and Manufacturing News, Toronto, makes the following comment:

If buying in general were as large as it is with some of the firms in Ontario just now there would be a large volume of business in the iron and steel trade. The firms buying now have government contracts of one kind and another, and the placing of more ship contracts is going to mean busy days ahead of several of the yards along the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence.

It is worth noting that British chains and anchors are having trouble in getting into the Canadian market. They were put to the test just this week in contract, but the business went to a United States firm. The price of the Old Country material was about ten per cent too high, but there is another reason that was against them. There were so many provisions as to price being altered if there were a change of hours, etc., that the figure could not be counted as final. Also the British firms persist in naming a flat price per pound for anchor and chains, combined, while the customer particularly specified that the price on chains and anchor was to be separate. The Old Country firm in question refused to tender in this way and as a result the tender was hardly considered as it could not be compared with other figures that put a price as asked for.

While not looking for higher prices for such lines as sheets, etc., it is worth noting that mills have withdrawn all concessions that have been offered for some time past, and several large sheet mills have withdrawn from the market, booked up for the time at least. One large manufacturer stated this week, "The buyer that puts off too long is going to get left."
