

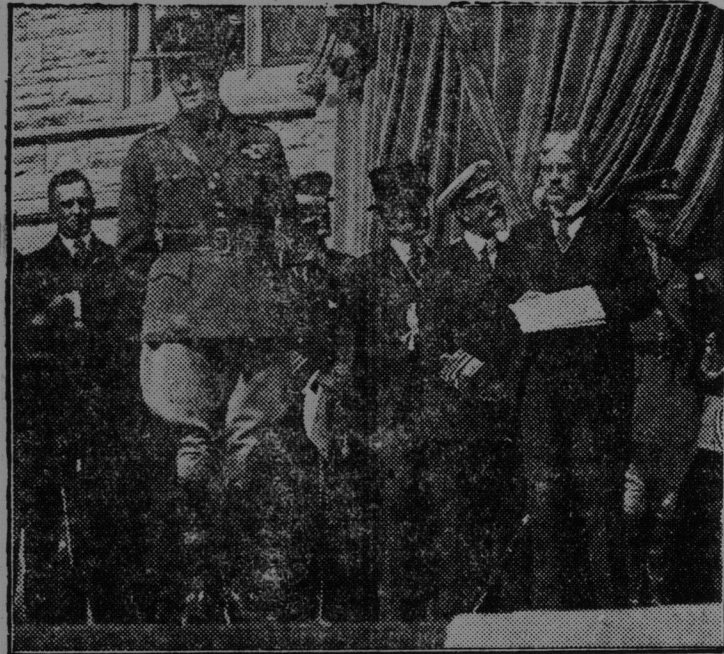

FIRST STEP TOWARDS VOCATIONAL TRAINING

Local School Board Decides to Appoint Committee—Longer Term for Night School—Dr. Bridges Reports on Trip to England

The decision to appoint a committee on vocational education, under the terms of the N. B. vocational education act, was reached at the monthly meeting of the board of school trustees last evening. The committee will be appointed by the chairman.

In a report on his trip to England and his study of the English school system, Dr. H. S. Bridges paid special attention to vocational training in the old country. He had been advised in England of the necessity of having a suitable building before vocational training is undertaken.

He also referred to the English scheme of establishing university courses in business men and the founding of a degree of commerce, and suggested that the Board of Trade might take up matter with the University of New Brunswick.

Resignations from the teaching staff were received and accepted from Miss K. Kelley and Miss Greta M. Gillis. Sister Francesca, principal of St. Vincent's High school, also tendered her resignation and as she had taught in the city for thirty years, giving most praiseworthy service, it was decided on the motion of Mr. Green that a letter of appreciation of her service should be sent to her and that the committee which had on hand the selecting of some suitable gift of recognition for Miss B. McLeod should be asked to select a similar one for Sister Francesca.

Thomas Hill's resignation as janitor of King George school was referred to the visitors of the school and a letter from A. E. Frame concerning the appointment of a superintendent of building was referred to a position on the teaching staff and the application was ordered placed on the book. Joseph Neve's appointment as janitor to Lord Edward school was announced. He is a returned soldier.

The finance committee's report which was confirmed with the sinking fund of \$5,000 city of St. John bonds paying 4 1/2 per cent, due November 1, 1920, at 93.3-4 per cent with accrued interest, and \$4,000 New Brunswick bonds paying 4 1/2 per cent, due December 1, 1920 at 89.6-18 with accrued interest.

REV. K. PALMER GIVES EVIDENCE

Testimony at Yesterday Afternoon's Session of the Guelph Novitiate Inquiry

Ottawa, Sept. 9.—At yesterday afternoon's session of the inquiry into the Guelph Novitiate charges, Rev. Kennedy Palmer, who preached a sermon and afterwards made the charges in connection with alleged conditions of the novitiate, was on the stand. He said that reports as to the conditions said to exist in the novitiate were so persistent that much feeling was stirred up, as the people thought inmates of that institution were illegally evading military service. He told of steps taken by himself to endeavor to get at the truth of the situation, of going to a newspaper office and being informed there that on the orders of the press conference from Ottawa no reference to the novitiate was to be printed. Mr. Palmer then preached a sermon in which he referred to the situation as disgraceful.

To Deputy Minister of Justice Mewcombe, Mr. Palmer admitted that the purpose of his sermon was to persuade the people of his congregation that men were being harbored at the novitiate who were escaping military service.

During the evidence of Sgt. Wilson it developed that a young man referred to as a son of Hon. C. J. Doherty was taken in the raid on the novitiate, that young Mr. Doherty accepted the effort to escape, merely asking if he might telephone, and that he did not appear to be at all frightened at the turn affairs had taken.

G. W. V. A. AND GRATUITY

In connection with the stand taken by Premier Sir Robert Borden in the matter of appointing a committee to meet a committee of the G. W. V. A. and discuss the question of further war gratuity, a resolution was passed by the executive of the local branch of the Great War Veterans' Association last evening instructing the secretary to communicate with the local members of parliament requesting them to support the bill to be introduced by Major Andrews, M. P. This bill provides for the appointment of a committee to investigate the claims of the association.

It was decided to accept the offer of the Y. W. P. A. to install a kitchenette in the rooms of the association.

A committee consisting of William Vassie, W. J. Brown, Alex. McMillan was appointed to interview employers and secure their agreement to give preference to returned soldiers in engaging employees. It is intended to publish the names of those that agree to this arrangement.

The Canadian Manufacturers' Association will hold meetings in the rooms of the board of trade next month. The engineering institute will hold a meeting tomorrow and continue until Friday.

AN ARMY WITHOUT PAY.

Ottawa, Sept. 9.—A citizen army without pay is suggested in a motion of which H. M. Mowat, of Parliament Hill, has given notice in the House. The motion provides that "in the opinion of this House it is a duty of every citizen in a democratic country to be ready to defend it, and that it is desirable as soon as may be to save the expense of a standing army and to substitute for it the training of all young men physically fit, and a reserve force of those already trained; that such training be done for such periods and seasons as will not substantially interfere with industrial life, and that no pay be given other than for personal comfort allowances."

Mr. Mowat has also given notice of a motion, similar to one he presented last session, that encouragement should be given to model town sites or garden cities.

SAYS EX-KAISER PERSECUTED AND INNOCENT MAN

Berlin, Sept. 9.—Dr. Ernest von Dryander, former court preacher, who during the course of the war preached numerous sermons in honor of Emperor William and the German army, has published a brochure on his personal impressions of the former emperor, in which he represents him as a persecuted and innocent man.

The publication contains intimations of the abnormal religious developments of the former emperor's mind. He cites one incident as follows:

In the autumn of 1916 the emperor exclaimed: "I hope for a miracle. The war broke out suddenly. Like a miracle will it end."

CONFERENCE TODAY ON VALLEY RAILWAY

"We hope to have an announcement to make regarding the operation of the Valley Railway in the course of a few days," Hon. W. E. Foster said last evening before leaving for Fredericton.

"I am informed that E. W. Beatty, president of the C.P.R., and D. B. Hannan, president of the Canadian National Railways, are to meet in Montreal tomorrow (Tuesday) morning to discuss the terms under which running rights from Westfield to St. John over the C.P.R. can be secured and we hope that."

ENORMITY OF PLAN STAGGERS AUDIENCE

Sir Adam Beck Tells Details of Chippewa Development Scheme.

Toronto, Sept. 9.—Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario, yesterday staggered the guests at the directors' luncheon at the Canadian National Exhibition today, when he told them, in a matter of minutes, the enormity of the Chippewa development scheme.

This project is being carried on on a larger scale than heretofore generally known. Sir Adam said, the undertaking was to cost between \$16,000,000 and \$18,000,000, and between 175,000 and 200,000 h.p. were to be developed. Subsequently, it was decided to double the capacity of the canal. Although the cost of the canal, which, when completed, he estimated at \$1,000,000, would be 6,000 feet, and the product of that would be 500,000 h.p. for peak loads, instead of 175,000 or 200,000 h.p. For ordinary purposes it will supply 425,000 horse power, and equipment will be installed to develop 525,000 h.p.

Sir Adam intimated that it was likely the hydro would accept Mayor Church's offer of a free site which was to erect a hydro building at the exhibition.

The hydro chairman stated that they would illuminate the Horseshoe Falls, and a few weeks hence.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

At a meeting of Montreal citizens with milk dealers last night the latter gave the reason for advancing the price of milk to fifteen cents a quart. The citizens are opposed to the advance and a suggestion has been made that cash and milk be established for the sale of milk in the city.

Admiral Kolchak is reported to have asked Japan for help, offering the island of Sakhalin as compensation.

Democrats and Republicans in the United States senate are hopeful of a compromise in the controversy on certain reservations in the league of nations covenant.

A drive for funds for the Protestant orphanage to be established in Martello Hotel, St. John, will be made in Fredericton tomorrow. D. Hipwell and W. M. Campbell of St. John spoke at a meeting in that city last night in the interests of the fund.

William G. Simmonds is in jail in Fredericton, charged by the mother-in-law, Mrs. Agnes M. Armstrong of Fredericton, with bigamy. She is the mother of his second wife, according to her session, the accused having been married in England, where his first wife and one child are now living.

Reverend J. Ryan was tendered a farewell reception at Woodstock, N. B., by his congregation last evening and made the recipient of a purse of \$300. He is leaving for Milltown on Thursday to take up his new pastorate.
