NEW CARDINALS

Canadian Archbishop Mentioned as Likely to Be Among The Number

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 7.—A cable from Rome to the Chicago Daily News, says that Pope Pius has decided to hold a consistory for the creation of new cardinals in the immediate future. The Archbishops of Vienna, Toledo, Cologne and Graus are mentioned. The Archbishop of Graus is primate of Hungary and is entitled to promotion, while the elevation to the cardinalate of the archbishops of Vienna and Toledo, is established by concordat. The archbishop of Cologne will be given the red hat at the request of Kaiser Wilhelm. The nuncio in Munich and a Canadian archbishop, whose identity is not disclosed, are mentioned as likely candidates. Several Italian prelates including the Archbishop of Bologna, are slated for promotion.

The number of new Italian cardinals probably will be between seven and ten. As the sacred college has been reduced to fifty-four, the number of foreign cardinals is nearly equal to that of the Italian cardinals.

Shooting Match Between Canadians and Coldstream Guards

London, Feb. 7.—The liveliest interest is evinced over the sporting challenge made by Hon. Col. Sam Hughes to the Coldstream Guards that he would pick thirty men who could beat a similar number chosen from the rank and file of the Coldstream.

Captain Phillips said yesterday that they would be delighted to take the Canadians on a try to win a new silk hat for Major Farquhar. That was the bet. He says, however, that the consent of the commanding officer will be necessary, but "for the honor of the regiment" this will not doubt be readily forthcoming.

The competition is a most desirable one, from Colonel Hughes' standpoint, as the Coldstream Guards are considered to be the best shooting unit in the brigade of guards.

New York, Feb. 7.—Sounds of sobbing issued from the cell, occupied by a stout man from Philadelphia as he bewailed the prospect of a 10-day stay in Blackwell's Island. Possession of several big, bright diamonds and a partly bank roll did not seem to cheer him. He had been sentenced night court by Magistrate Freschi as a masher.

"Nothing is prettier than a skirt with a single but striking and well-chosen detail. My collection contains narrow skirts and crinolines and I have dressed but no bustles."

"In dress I have designed a new skirt which should prove popular. It is a simple skirt without being all it shows off the leg and figure in a discreet and charming way."
