ATTACKING PARTY WON DECISION IN SHAM BATTLE
What was considered the most practical and successful programme of tactical manoeuvres with the members of the 62nd regiment, St. John Fusiliers, was the sham battle held on Saturday afternoon in the woods near Rockwood Park. A "Red" force under Captain Miller was supposed to arrive on the Boston boat early in the afternoon and immediately marched on the position of the "Blue" force, firmly entrenched near Howe's Lake guarding, supposedly, some German prisoners. The defending force was under Captain Dunfield, and gave a stiff resistance to the invaders but, in the judgment of the umpire-in-chief, Col. J. L. McAvity, a flank movement made by the attacking force was successful in causing the capture of the defence and the release of the prisoners. The "Red" force was accordingly awarded the decision in the fray.
The men under Captain Miller were for the most part from "A" Co. of the regiment, composed of business men, clerks and others who are giving their services gratuitously, drilling steadily, and taking range practice regularly. The men under Captain Dunfield were those who have been in active service in the home defence. Both entered into Saturday's arrangements with vigorous enthusiasm.

SIR WILFRID LAURIER SPEAKS ON THE WAR
Toronto, Sept. 12—"Let us keep our powder dry, and trust in God. Victory is coming victory is ours. There may be reverses, brothers, there will be reverses, but freedom will win. Let us trust in God."
At the close of a stirring address, delivered at the luncheon of the directors of the Canadian National Exhibition this afternoon, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, leader of the opposition, moved his hearers to great depths with the above appeal.
