

ENGLISH SETTER TAKES HONORS AT DOG SHOW

James Lattimer's Dog Wins President's Cup—Ben M. Montgomery's Dog a Close Second.

At the fourteenth annual dog show of the New Brunswick Kennel Club, staged in connection with the St. John exhibition, premier honors for the whole show went to James Lattimer's English setter, Britania's Pride, and this dog was awarded the president's cup. The vice-president's cup for the best dog of opposite sex to the high score entry went to Ben Montgomery's Irish setter, Mayo Terry. Both awards were greeted with rounds of applause. Freeman Lloyd of the editorial staff of Field and Stream, paid a high tribute to the sporting dogs benched, saying that for a community the size of St. John the breeds were well above the average. The judging was finished last night.

Three New Champions.

Three of the entries in this year's show attained their championships. John Russell's pointer, Ketepec Ranger, bred by James Laddlaw, of this city, from Goodwin's Jerry ex Princess Patricia, October 26, 1919, became a champion, as did also the West Highland white terrier, Moccasin Lucy, owned by J. W. Cameron, 22 Wright street. The third championship was attained by the tiny Pomeranian bitch, Wee Goddess of Pomona, from the Pomona Kennels, owned by Madam D. Bland, of Montreal, and bred by herself.

Silver cups for the best dogs and bitches in each breed shown and special cups and prizes for best sporting dog, best non-sporting dog, etc., as detailed below, were presented by Mayor H. R. McEllan.

The correct awards in the Newfoundland classes judged on Monday were as follows:

A Fine Trio.

A trio of dogs which attracted a great deal of attention was benched by Mrs. P. A. Margeson, of Kentville (N. S.).

They were the Pekingese dog Tung Ling of Cedarcrest, Pekingese bitch, Kotssette of Burdorp, and the former's sire, Ting Fang of Meridale. Ting Fang was the best of the open dogs and took the winners ribbon for dogs and special for the class.

Tung Ling carried off blue ribbons for Canadian bred dogs, limit dogs and took second in open dogs. Kotssette won limit and open bitches and was winners in the bitches.

Ting Fang was matched against all the toy dogs in the show and carried off first honors, and with Tung Ling won the ribbon for the best brace of toys. He also was awarded the Nova Scotia special for the best in the show from that province.

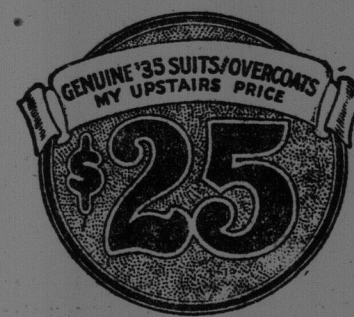
