of town right away, going to another logging camp, operated by a man whose name I believe was Kaposinski, at Hinton, Alberta. This was about 4 weeks after we had left Red Deer.

We worked there for about another 6 weeks. We then decided that we would return to Red Deer and give ourselves up. This we planned to do after our next pay-day. However, four or five days previous to pay-day, Line went into Edson for the day and was apprehended by the R.C.M.P. From him they learned where I was, and the next day came to the camp and arrested me.

We were then returned to Red Deer, and I have been under close arrest since that time. Pte. Line was later discharged as he was underage. I had turned eighteen on the 11th of March, 1942, and so was kept for trial.

I had no trouble with the police in civil life, and since my return to Red Deer have behaved myself to the best of my ability.

The above I swear to be a true statement.

- Q.12 In your statement you state that you were working on farms around your home for about two years before joining the Army. You enlisted about the middle of September last year. At that time did you leave a job or were you unemployed?
- A.12 I left a job.
