Uniform for War Secretary.

London, Aug. 1.-Lord Dunsford suggested that Mr. Haldane should wear uniform and be liable to court-martial when he spoke Saturday at a meeting of the Council of the Imperial Mission at St. Dunstan's, Regent's Park, the residence of the Earl of Londesborough. He said: "Great changes have recently taken place in the management of the armed forces of the crown, not only in Mother Country, but in the colonies. Some of these changes have been for good, but others, I think, might be harmful in the future. "The power hitherto held by the military commander in conjunction with the Secretary of State for War has, apparently, been absorbed entirely by the latter, and I have hoped that this Minister, besides absorbing the powers, will also take upon himself some of the penalties. "I have hopes that he will assume uniform and rank and render himself amenable to court-martial and to the inevitable bullet if it is found, when the country goes to war, that it is deficient in rifles, in ammunition, or in anything that renders defeat not unlikely."

Escaped Convict Caught.

Ottawa, Aug. 1.-Col. A. P. Sherwood, head of the Dominion police, was yesterday notified of an important arrest at Winnipeg by Chief E. J. Elliott, one of the Dominion force officers. He took in charge Pierre Vincier, who is wanted by the Belgian Government, and who, in 1907, was sentenced to six years on a charge of indecent assault on children under 11 years of age. Vincier, while held at or near Plazendo, Orientales, Belgium, escaped without serving any of the sentence.

Sunk In Collision.

Amherstburg, Aug. 1.-The Grace Whitney, a coal barge in tow of the steamer Maine, upward bound, was sunk three miles south and southeast of Bar Point light early yesterday morning. The steamer Ogdensburg collided with her, and she went down immediately. Two of the crew were drowned.

To Be 52nd Rangers Rifle Regiment.

Berlin, Aug. 1.-The new Twin City regiment is now a sure thing. It will be listed as the 52nd Rangers Rifle Regiment, with headquarters at Berlin. Over 200 young men have enlisted, which is considerably more than is required for a four company regiment.

New Height Broken.

Brussels, Aug. 1.-M. Oleslaghe, the Belgian aviator, Saturday made a monoplane flight to a height of 4775 feet, a new world's record for monoplane.

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SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN LAND WEST LAND REGULATIONS

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties - Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 20 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead for \$5.00 per acre. Duties - Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn home stead patent) and cultivate 50 acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties - Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
