


Britain's Trade



Rates of Commission on Money Orders.

The rates of cormission on Money Orders issued by any Money Order Office in Newfoundland to the United States of America, the Dominion of Canada and any part of Newfoundland, are as follows:

For sums not exceeding \$19 Over \$10 but not exceeding \$20 - 10 etc.
Over \$20 but not exceeding \$30 - 15 etc.
Over \$20 but not exceeding \$30 - 20 etc.
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Over \$40 but not exceeding \$60 - 35 etc.
Over \$50 but not exceeding \$60 - 36 etc.
Over \$60 but not exceeding \$70 - 35 etc.
Over \$76 but not exceeding \$70 - 35 etc.
Over \$76 but not exceeding \$80 - 45 etc. Over \$80 but not exceeding \$90 - 45 ets Over \$90 but act exceeding \$100 - 46 ets o any of the above countries and at effices in Newfoundland, \$100, but as many may be obtained as the remitter requires. Maximum amount of a single Order
