Under the Provisions of the War Measures Act, 1914, His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to order as follows:-

1. The Colonial Secretary may, if he considers it expedient so to do, appoint a person to be Censor of the writings, copy or matter printed or the publications issued at any printing establishment or works, and any person so appointed shall have the right to enter and visit the premises with any assistant or assistants, from time to time, and remain there for such time or times as may be reasonably necessary, and to examine, consider, approve or reject any writing, copy or matter printed or proposed to be printed at or issued from the said premises, and, after the appointment of any such person and the notification thereof to the proprietor, manager or person in charge of the said premises, no writing, copy or other matter shall be printed there or issued for publication therefrom which is not approved by the person so appointed as Censor, and any such printing or issue for publication, without such approval, shall be deemed to be a contravention of this order.

2. The printing or circulation or procuring to be printed or circulated, or any letter, communication, report or news concerning the operations of the present war or the movement of any of the forces, naval or military, of His Majesty or of His Majesty's allies, or as to any of the naval or military forces or operations of His Majesty or of His Majesty's allies, connected with or for the purpose of the war, or of criticism or commenting upon the policy, proceedings or action of the Government or any neutral state, if such printing or circulation or any of the statements contained in such letter, communication, report or news be likely to cause disaffection to His Majesty or to prevent, hinder or interfere with the success of any such force, or to interfere with the success of the forces by land or by sea of His Majesty or of His Majesty's allies, or to prejudice His Majesty's relations with any foreign state or otherwise to assist or encourage the enemy, or to prevent, embarrass or hinder the successful prosecution of the war, shall be deemed to be a contravention of this order, and, in any prosecution for or in respect of any such offence committed by the authority of the Attorney-General, it shall be presumed, in the absence of proof to the contrary, that the printing or circulation of the statements in respect of which the prosecution is brought were likely to cause disaffection to His Majesty or to prevent, hinder or interfere with the success of any such force, or to prejudice His Majesty's relations with any foreign state or otherwise to assist or encourage the enemy, or to prevent, embarrass or hinder the successful prosecution of the war.

3. For any contravention of this order the offender shall be liable upon indictment to imprisonment for a term not exceeding two years, and to a fine not exceeding five thousand dollars, or upon summary conviction to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months, and to a fine not exceeding two thousand dollars; and the proprietor or officer of any corporation controlling or operating the premises, where any such offence is committed, shall also be liable upon indictment or summary conviction to imprisonment and fine as aforesaid. Moreover, all copies of any book, newspaper, periodical, pamphlet, or tract printed, issued, circulated or published in contravention of this order, in the possession of whomsoever they may be, may be seized and destroyed by any peace officer, and, if the Colonial Secretary "so direct, the printing presses, plan and machinery within or connected with the premises may be closed indefinitely or for such period as the Colonial Secretary may name.

POSITION.—On Jeans Head, the Northern promontory of the entrance to New Perlican.

DESCRIPTION.—An Occulting White, Dioptric Light of the 4th Order.

PERIODS.—Seven seconds light followed by three seconds eclipse, thus:

ILLUMINATED ARC.—Visible in all directions seaward.

ELEVATIONS.—Height of light from H. W. to focal plane, 159½ feet. Height of tower from base to top of lantern, 27½ feet.

STRUCTURES.—The Station comprises an octagonal wooden tower with sloping sides, and Kessler's dwelling, a one-story flat-roofed building, connected to tower by a covered passage way.

COLOUR.—WHITE.

REMARKS.—This light will be put in operation during month of September ensuing, without further notice.

Expose Vast Teuton Plot

Criminal Part of German Propaganda in United States Known

New York, Nov. 21.—The skeleton story of the criminal part of the Teuton propaganda in this country with the names of the master minds who originated it, the executive who supervised part of the work, and many of the German or Austro-Hungarian agents who carried out their orders is likely to be told to the Federal grand jury within a few days, if, in fact, part of the plot has not been presented to it.

It deals with a conspiracy against the industries of the United States, the plan, the execution, the agents, and other details that have been filling or doing for the Teuton allies. It treats of plans to cripple many factories, and if suggestions are correct, it may deal with still graver affairs.

The conspiracy, the greatest and most gigantic without doubt ever developed in this country, involves diplomatic agents, who, of course, are exempt from punishment; innominate agents, distinguished by the initials "G"; and many men in the employ of the Governments of the Central Powers, though they presumably had positions with reliable business connections throughout the country.

For many months Government officials in New York, Washington and other cities throughout the country have been working busily digging up a mass of evidence. Documents have been found in this country and many papers have been obtained in foreign countries. This mass of evidence, when sifted, analyzed and pieced together into one vast mosaic, is said to reveal a plot of nation wide proportions, a series of intrigues, moves and counter moves, which have been fathered by several master minds of the world.

The evidence that has been gathered from the letters which Capt. James E. Archibald carried for Dr. Dumba, dismissed Austro-Hungarian Ambassador to this country, Capt. von Papen and other diplomatic agents, forms only a small part of the case now being worked up. The charges made by Dr. Goricar, ex-Austrian Consul in this country, against Count von Bernstorff, German Ambassador to this country; Capt. von Ed. Caplan, ex-Austrian Consul in this country; and Alexander Naber von Perked, have been regarded as sensational, but the evidence which Dr. Goricar can present is hard to need for the substantiation of the details of the alleged conspiracy.

Should indictments be returned, and there seems to be little doubt of it, the details will come out in full. The Department of Justice has been working on the case for months and the evidence is said to have been submitted to the President. Delay in presenting the evidence to the jury is believed to have been due to the desire of the President to make sure of every specific charge and to have each allegation supported by uncontroverted evidence.

The great genius in the propaganda, it is said was Dr. Dumba. It was because of his rare gifts that he was selected by the Central Powers for the task of taking steps here that would cripple the enemy's preparations for the fighting in the trenches.

Germany, it is said, was to furnish the money. Dr. Goricar already has charged that Count von Bernstorff had at least \$400,000 at his command. Franz Rintelen, the mysterious German, who spent many months in this country, is said to have boasted that he would command \$30,000,000 for any necessary work. Evidence of the money offered to leaders of laboring men, of the strategic moves that were worked out for the workmen who could go on strike and of the way in which these plans finally miscarried, has all been gathered and shaped up in legal form.

Funds have been traced with the utmost accuracy. Evidence has been dug up to show how money traveled through various channels to men who have done work in behalf of the Teuton cause. It has been shown that money has been sent to various countries, to be paid to men presu-

Bulgaria Fears Russia

London, Nov. 20.—Telegraphing from Bucharest, the Times correspondent says: In view of threatened Russian intervention, preparations for defence are actively proceeding along the whole Bulgarian frontier under German supervision. Troops are being brought up to the Serbian front, and about four divisions of General Von der Goltz are reported to have joined the Bulgarian forces.

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Official

The Governor, Newfoundland:

London, Nov. 20.—In France an enemy aeroplane was brought down in the sea near Westende. A torpedo boat was launched from Ostend and attempted to salve the machine. It was sunk by Allied seaplanes and artillery. One enemy company attacked north of Ladyrith and was repulsed. An attempted enemy attack with poisoned gas near Bethencourt, miscarried. There were successful air raids on aviation sheds near Mulhausen and Noyon station.

In Italy, increasing successes are reported near Gorizia. About four hundred prisoners were captured. In Serbia, the enemy claims that communication with Turkey and Bulgaria is effected and their great operations are closed.

In the Cameroons, various successes are reported near the centre of hostile resistance at Jaunde.

London Times correspondent at Bucharest says Germans are preparing for defence of Bulgarian frontier against threatened Russian and Roumanian invasion.

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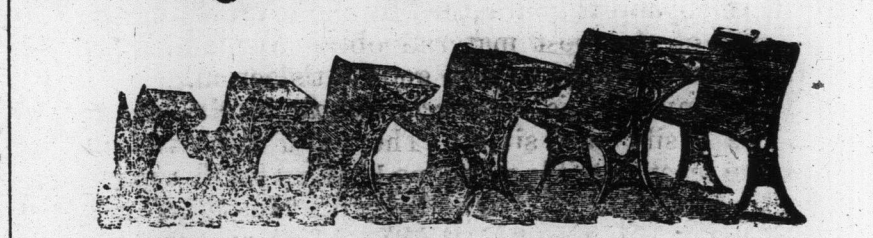
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
