





Rates of Commission on Money Orders.


The rates of commission on Money Orders issued by any Money Order Ofice in Newfoundland to the United States of America, the Dominion of Canada and any part of Newfoundland, are as follows:

For sums not exceeding \$10 - 5 cts Over \$10 but not excesding \$20 - 10 cts Over \$20 but not exceeding \$60 - 15 cts Over \$30 but not exceeding \$40 - 20 cts Over \$40 but not exceeding \$50 - 25 cts Over \$50 but not exceeding \$60 - 30 cts Over \$60 but not exceeding \$70 - 35 ots Over \$76 but not exceeding \$86 - 40 cts Over \$86 but not exceeding \$90 - 45 cts Over \$90 but not exceeding \$100 50 ct Maximum amount of a single Order
