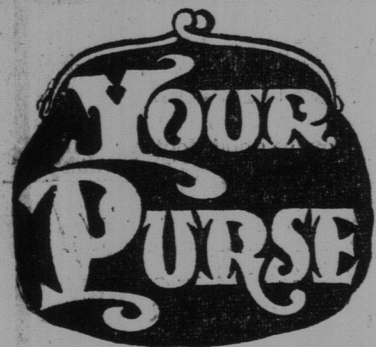

OFFICIAL STATEMENT OF RIOT CASUALTIES.

WERE BREAD RIOTS.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 1, 3 a. m.—The official report of disturbances at Warsaw shows that they were chiefly of the character of bread riots and not the evidence of a political movement. The rioters pillaged shops, set fire to get food and drink, and then erected barricades and fired upon soldiers. The disturbances are now quiet.

ST. PETERSBURG CASUALTIES.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 31.—An official statement issued today gives the casualties in the collisions between strikers and troops on Jan. 22 as 86 killed and 223 wounded. Of the latter 23 have died.

WARSAW IS QUIET.

WARSAW, noon, Feb. 1.—The city is quiet, though great tenacity still prevails. Some stores and offices have been re-opened, but the strike has extended to the sugar refineries and other factories in the districts around Warsaw.
