"The 15th of last March I anchored at Strey Island, lat 5, 12 N. lon. 162 20 E. It is about teen miles long, and contains, I should judge, 24 inhabitants; the bark Pearl, of Sippiena, had chored two days previous to my nervel; the series of St. John, N. B., had been here and but returned again while I was there. After he goes out, two of the natives whom Capt. Reu had taken away with him from this Island, info ed him that a whale ship, having considerable on board, had been taken by the natives, all ha killed, and the ship burned. Capt.
