SCOTCH CURLERS ON THEIR OWN ICE AT HOME

By One of Them.

In view of the fact that the Scotch curlers are now in St. John, the appended story about the players from across the water, and written by a person who had only recently arrived from the old land, should prove interesting reading to curlers in general.

The ancient and roaring game of curling is played in Scotland by gentle and simple, and when Jack Frost plays a visit long enough to form a good strong sheet of ice, the laird, minister and man grip their brooms and betake themselves to the village pond or loch, where all are placed on the same level, literally, and fraternize like brothers, the keenest and most enthusiastic members deriving the greater enjoyment from the grand old game.

Scotch curlers play mostly off the crampet, which is a small iron or zinc plate, with a rough surface to keep the player from slipping, and with spikes on the under side, which enter the ice and keep the plate in place, and so shaped that the curler can deliver his stone without any inconvenience. The hole, which is simply a niche made in the ice, for the fore part of the foot to enter, is used in some districts, and when two teams meet, who have been used to playing, one on the crampet and the other on the loch, the former feel a bit strange, but soon get familiar with the later style, which is generally the one adopted.

Entertaining Visitors.

When two clubs have arranged to play a match, the club at whose pond the game is played entertains the visitors, the contest often lasting from daylight to darkness. Choosing the Players.

The leading player is chosen for his part, because of his ability to draw consistently to the "pat lid," a stone on either side of the tee and a little off the side, "to allow room for the opponent's stone to run through it, if strong," or a stone placed near the tee with a close guard being considered good play for the lead. The second player is expected to draw the first should be required at his hands, the third player is supposed to be able to "roll all the shots known from breaking up the lead to get at the winner, to wicking out the winner, of which only one inch or so of it can be seen through a hole in the stone. Each player is expected to stand by and scoop her up whenever the skip gives the order, many a shot which was carefully watched, well kept, being the decisive one in a keenly-contested match.
