

Toronto, Feb. 19.—The body of Bert Newman, a maniac who disappeared from Mimico some six miles from Toronto, was found this morning half a mile west of the Credit River, frozen to death.

Detroit, Mich., Feb. 19.—Rev. J. A. Cottam, pastor of the Methodist church at Dearborn, a suburb, was arrested here today on a warrant charging him with burning his parsonage, on January 15. He is at once resigned as pastor.

LIFE PRESERVER MARKED KNIVELIK FOUND

Official of U. S. Department of Education Received it from a Native at Kivalinab

Ottawa, Feb. 19.—An explanation of the finding of a life preserver from Stefansson's Arctic ship, the Karluk, at Kivalinab, Alaska, last October, is given in a letter received by the deputy minister of naval affairs, from the Department of the Interior at Washington.

G. S. Maguire, an official of the United States department of education at Kivalinab, found the life preserver there.

An extract from Maguire's letter reads: "We have just passed through perhaps the very worst storm that has been known here for years."

After the storm passed a native brought me a life preserver which had floated in marked Karluk and it that given in the name of one of Stefansson's boats it may signify trouble.

The last authentic word received about the Karluk states that she had broken away from the ice on September 25 at a point about seventy miles east of Point Barrow. The distance from Kivalinab to Point Barrow is three hundred and fifty miles.

Mr. Desbarats is inclined to think that the preserver was washed overboard when the Karluk was some distance out from Kivalinab, about the middle of last August.

AUTHORS FAVOR TAKING PART IN PANAMA SHOW

Send Petition to Asquith Urging British Government to have Representation at Exposition.

London, Feb. 19.—Sir Arthur Conan Doyle today forwarded to Premier Asquith a petition signed by prominent British authors urging British participation in the Panama-Pacific exposition at San Francisco in 1915.

The petition dwells on the moderation of the expenditure involved compared with the great harm which would result from the deterioration of the good relations existing between Great Britain and the United States.

A memorial to the same effect signed by three hundred members of the House of Commons is a ready for presentation to the Premier.

SGHR. HERALD AWAITS HELP FROM PORTLAND

Portland, Me., Feb. 19.—A request for assistance of the American schooner Herald, St. John, N. B., for New York, icebound in St. Mary's Bay, N. E., was received at the custom house today. It was expected that the revenue cutter Woodbury would be sent to aid the Herald after taking on coal.
